Big Merger Suggested

REGINA, Feb. 1.—A proposal for some sort of amalgamation which would co-ordinate the activities of the United Grain Growers Limited, the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, and the three prairie wheat pools, define their separate fields, and prevent any possibility of competition among them in the future was endorsed by the Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Convention this morning.

The various companies, which have been grouped "into one great co-operative marketing concern," and the directors were empowered to take whatever action they think fit to give effect to the recommendations.

President Edwards endorsed the proposal strongly, and said it would be nothing short of a tragedy if the various companies could not be linked up so that each would be its own field of work. Hon. George Langley declared that sooner or later they all must come together.

John W. Ward, secretary of the Canadian Council of Agriculture, presented a report covering the varied activities of that organization during the past year.

Will Limit Export Of Pulpwood

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Feb. 1.—The Canadian Pulp and Paper Association would put itself on record as in favor of limitation of export of pulpwood. Without any opposition a motion along the lines of restriction presented by F. W. Clarke, chairman of the Mechanical Pulp Association, was adopted at the meeting.

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SERVICES AT ST. PETERS CATHEDRAL

At St. Peter's Cathedral on Sunday there was a good congregation at the 11 a. m. service which was a choral Mass. The setting being Moar in E flat, which was well rendered by the choir.

The Incumbent, Rev. E. M. Malone, preached from the Gospel for the day, the 11th Sunday after the Epiphany, which was the story of the healing of the Gadarene Demoniac. He compared our Lord's command to the healed man to "go home and tell what great things the Lord hath done for thee" with His answer to the scribe who desired to follow the Master but was told "foxes have holes and the birds of the air nests, but the Son of Man hath no where to lay His head."

His reply to another who desired first to go and bury his father before undertaking the work of the Kingdom. From the replies of Christ to these three he pointed out the type of character that was needed in the Kingdom of God.

At Evensong at 7 p. m. the service was festive in character and full of choral, the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis being sung in Field in C. It was the eve of Candlemas, the Feast of Light, which is known as the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary or the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. The altar was vested in white, with white haggings and in addition to the usual lights, two large branch candlesticks standing on each side of the altar were lit making the sanctuary look extremely dignified and beautiful.

The sermon dealt with the occasion of Christ's presentation in the Temple when the aged Simeon took the infant Jesus in his arms saying "Nunc Dimittis." "Lord now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace." It was an appeal to Christians to stretch out their arms and to lay hold on Christ. Simeon waited for the coming of Christ. We too, if we receive Christ like Simeon will be able to declare, "Mine eyes have seen Thy salvation."

At the end of the service a procession led by a cross bearer, in which two banners were carried, started from the altar and went around the church returning to the altar where the Incumbent pronounced the Benediction.

The Speed Skating Ch'ship

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Feb. 1.—Francis Allen of Chicago won the amateur speed skating championship of Canada in the two day's meet that ended here Saturday, with 220 points. Charles Gorman of St. John, N. B., and Ed. Murphy of Chicago tied for a second place. Lida Brooks of Toronto was the Ladies' champion, while all the events for boys of 14 and under went east, George Fowler of St. John leading.

Seventy-Five Years Ago

On Wednesday, the 16th inst., Mr. Isaac Murray was ordained to the pastoral charge of the Presbyterian congregation of Cavendish near New London. The introductory sermon was preached by the Rev. R. S. Peterson, from 2 Tim. 3: 17. That clause—"that the man of God may be perfect." The steps were narrated, the questions proposed, and the ordination prayer offered up by Rev. Prof. Kier, who also addressed the minister. The Rev. Mr. Sinclair gave the charge to the people. The whole of the services were solemn and deeply affecting. It will be remembered that this congregation some time ago, although deeply attached to him, in answer to what they considered a call of Providence, surrendered up their late esteemed pastor, the Rev. John Gault, that he might carry the glad tidings of salvation far hence unto the Gentiles. Since that period they have been without the labors of a fixed pastor. We trust that through the divine blessing the labors of Mr. Murray may be eminently successful.—Presbyterian Witness, Feb. 2, 1850.

List of Non-Concurring Churches Steadily Growing

MONTREAL, Jan. 31.—The Presbyterian Assesment report to date shows 320 congregations have voted against union, of these 225 are in Ontario 22 in Quebec, 35 in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, 12 in Saskatchewan, 18 in Alberta, 12 in British Columbia. The list of non-concurring churches is steadily growing and the Presbyterians are greatly encouraged by the results.

No Credence Given Rumors

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Feb. 1.—Rumors that Sir Henry Thorne, President of the Canadian National Railways will resign on the expiration of his three year contract with the Government next October are given no credence here.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Feb. 1.—The export trade in Canadian grain here Saturday was slow and little business was transacted. A stronger feeling developed for oats in the local cash grain market and prices were advanced another two cents per bushel. Ontario No. 2 white oats below quoted at 72 cents. No. 3 grade at 70 cents and No. 4 grade at 68 cents per bushel. No change of any importance occurred in the spring wheat flour market and prices were unchanged, but they were not advanced for month of January of \$1.50 per bushel and they are \$5.50 per barrel higher than a year ago. Prices for all grades of winter wheat flour were well maintained at the recent advanced level. A fair trade was transacted in millfeed and the tendency was firm. The volume of business in rolled oats was small but the undertone was firm. There was a good demand for all grades of eggs and the turnover was moderate. White prices displayed no further change. The butter market was inactive. The local demand for cheese continues good with fodder made No. 1 goods selling at 20 1/2 to 20 3/4 per pound and No. 2 grade at 19 1/2 to 12 1/2 cents per pound. Crop beans were unchanged at \$2.90 per bushel.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 1.—May 20 will mark the end of Jack Dempsey's ring career, the termination of his ring and business partnership with Jack Kearns, his manager and his second entrance into the state of matrimony, according to the date of his birthday, which he would "probably" quit fighting about May 20th.

He said that he expected to marry Estelle Taylor, film actress, on or about that date, her birthday, but he added:

"I am open for bouts until that time and am keeping in training." Dempsey said that after his retirement from fighting he might "go into the pictures or open a gymnasium."

As to his relations with Jack Kearns, his manager, the champion said that his dealings with Kearns were purely on a business basis; that they were interested together in several real estate deals.

Rickard Not Convicted

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Unconvinced that Jack Dempsey intended to retire as a result of his forthcoming marriage, Tex Rickard announced today he was going ahead with plans to match the champion and Tom Gibbons for a title bout here about June 1st.
