## ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

### LEAP year skate, tonight.

THERE was crossing each way at the Capes Saturday. The mails reached the city at 3.15 p. m.

Rev. Mr. Frizzle of Winsloe, preached very acceptably at Pownal yesterday. Rev. Mr. Opie took Rev. Mr. Frizzle's circuit.

Rev. A. F. Fisher, B. D., of Northport, N. S., preached two excellent sermons to good congregations in Zion Church yesterday.

PREPARATIONS are being made for a big demonstration at St. Andrew's on July 13th next, the 100th anniversary of the building of their first church.

THE Minto reached Pictou Saturday morning at nine o'clock and the Stanley left at 9.30 for Georgetown. She was out all day however and did not manage to reach Georgetown.

THE Soldiers' Monument in the Gardens was appropriately draped on Saturday afternoon in memory of the Island boys who sacrificed their lives in the capture of Cronje, Alfred Riggs and Roland Taylor.

At the Police Court Saturday the adjourned case against John McKenna was concluded by a conviction against the defendant who was fined \$200 and costs. This was a complicated case, the convicting evidence being mainly mail orders.

THE Stanley reached Georgetown yesterday from Pictou from where she had sailed Saturday morning. A special came to the City at five o'clock yesterday and took the mails down again last night. This, however, is not a permanent arrangement but for last night only.

THE weather during the past three days has been the coldest of the winter even exceeding that of part of January. The thermometer registered 18 degrees below zero early yesterday morning and on Saturday morning at three o'clock it was 17 below. Yesterday the weather greatly moderated and at nine last night it was 20 above.

## GEORGETOWN AND VICINITY

The news of the death on Saturday morning of Hannah Cummings aged 82, wife of Thomas Hessian, Georgetown will be learned with deep regret by many readers. The late Mrs. Hessian was a kindly hearted Christian in the home circle and beloved by the community where she had many warm friends. The bereaved husband and family have the sincere sympathy of all.
