My advent as a writer for the public began when I was eleven years old and nobody knew the first thing about it. Frank Forrester's Boys' and Girls' magazine which came to me regularly in Boston, did not come to me in Charlottetown. One of its features that I missed was the Puzzle Department.

The construction of enigmas, riddles, etc., had interested me as much as the work of solving them. My playmates had grown familiar with all the puzzles in the back numbers of the magazine that had accompanied me to Charlottetown and it occurred to me to try my hand on some original ones.

They were printed, which would not happen now in any well regulated newspaper office, for there was no name signed to them. Week after week they appeared and folks began to wonder who was writing them. So did I! It didn't seem as if they were mine.

About the same time I developed quite a reputation among the boys and girls as a story teller. Some of my stories were in verse. It never occurred to me to try to get my stories and verses printed. That came about through an interest I had developed in the art of printing.

school work it was my good fortune to be the regnant star. For that there is an explanation. From the time when I was able to write I began to have correspondence with relatives in other places. My father who was a good letter writer himself, was greatly interested in my efforts and devised a method of teaching me that had much to do, I believe, in drawing out whatever literary ability I possessed.

Before my letters were committed to paper, they were written on a large slate, one of the sort that the faddish foolishness that mars our present school system has relegated to roofs. Slates make good roof covering, but my slate fulfilled its mission under the roof of my head. My father read, revised and corrected my letters, and because of the results I regard him as having been one of my most efficient teachers.

That old Central Academy which became eventually the Prince of Wales College, where also I was student, turned out a number of boys who have made their marks in the world as men. To me they are still as boys for it is a singular fact that I have never met any of them since we ceased to be boys. Among them was one who captured my particular esteem by his ability to make me play second fiddle to him in our general school work.

Lou Davies was a son of the Hon. Benjamin Davies, a local merchant and prominent in the affairs of our island government. Lou was a handsome boy, keenly intellectual, a diligent student, and a splendid playmate. Everybody liked him. He was a good boy; not too good, but as good as any live boy can be who is not a sort of mollycoddle.

I like to think of him as Lou Davies; but when my thoughts turn toward him in these days I am thinking of the Right Hon. Sir Louis Henry Davies, K. C. M. G., Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and a member of the Privy Council of King George V.
