RINGWORM ON CATTLE.—A Dunstaffnage, P. E. I. correspondent writes to the Atlantic Leader "What causes ringworm on cattle and what is the remedy?" That paper replies: Ringworm is caused by a small insect that grows in the skin and is transmitted from one animal to another. Circular patches, varying from half an inch to several inches in circumference from which hair has fallen, appear. These patches have a white scurfy appearance and are usually about the head and neck. The treatment consists of rubbing a mixture of sulphur and lard well into these parts after washing with warm water and soap every four or five days. Three or four applications usually is a cure. Painting the parts with tincture of iodine usually has a curative effect.

VIOLATIONS OF FISHERY REGULATIONS.—The Fisheries Department of this province during the past season has made a total of 51 prosecutions for violations of the fishing regulations; 48 convictions were secured and forty-five fines paid. For violation of the lobster regulations there were 42 prosecutions, 39 convictions and 2 uncollected fines.

NO CHANGE IN LOBSTER SEASON.—The Inspector of Fisheries is in receipt of a letter from Mr. Ward Fisher, Divisional Inspector of Fisheries for the eastern Division stating that there will be no change in the lobster season for the western end of the Province this year, but that the matter was being carefully considered for next year, so that the packers and fishermen may proceed to prepare for the early season as usual.

WESTERN LINE CLEAR.—The train service west of Summerside was badly disarranged last week. This was due to the fact that considerable ice was on the track and as a consequence it had to be "picked" almost all the way from O'Leary to Tignish. The train which left here Wednesday afternoon got stalled at St. Louis and the mixed train which left Summerside on Thursday afternoon got stalled near West Devon. The mails and passenger service was accordingly badly disrupted and teams had to be utilized both for the conveyance of mails and passengers. The railway management however by extra exertion was able to get the whole line open by Saturday night and the last stalled train came in from Tignish, arriving here Sunday evening.

THE MAIL SERVICE.—Although the winter has been a very severe one the car ferry steamer has been able to give an excellent service and the mails are coming in with fair regularity. It is certainly a decided improvement over former years. So far this winter the mail has missed only on three occasions. During the past two weeks and during the present week mail clerks have been stationed at Sackville so that no accumulation of mails has occurred and the of

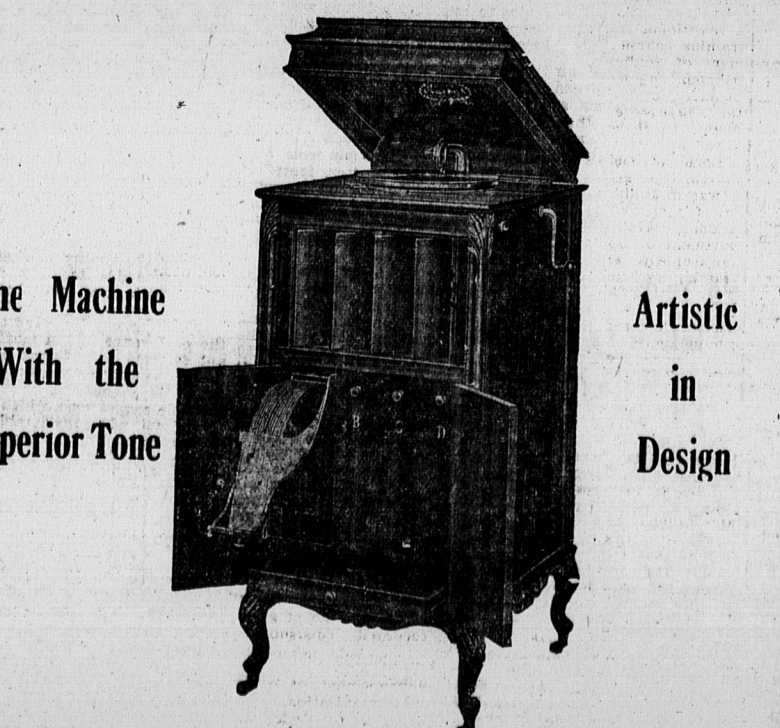

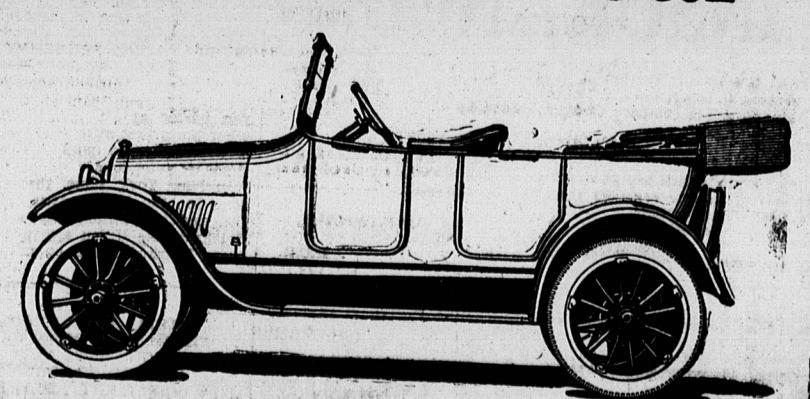
