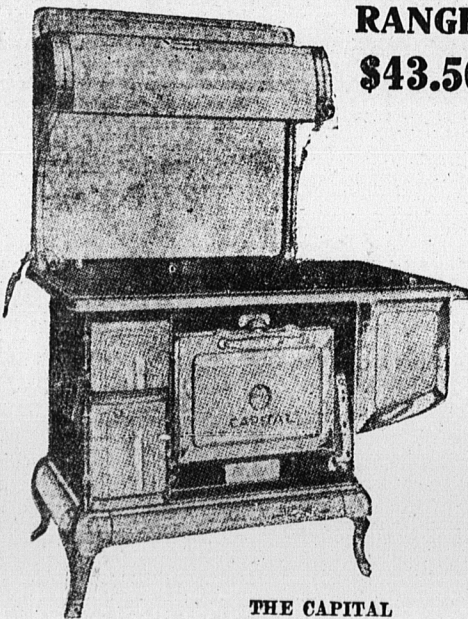

**Postage Stamps
For Wall Paper**

In a room of a house at Jacques
River, N. B., built by the grandfa-
ther of John C. Barclay, in 1881, A.
D., is to be seen, a wall paper con-
sisting of old postage stamps, says
the Campbellton Graph. The
apartment measures approximately
13 ft. by 10 ft. and 5 ft. in height. A
double framed and sashed window
amply lights the room. A framed
and panelled door about 6 ft. 10 ins.
in height gives access to the room
and even the inside of the door with
its 4 panels has come under the dec-
oration scheme. The ceiling is the
only part of the interior which has
escaped the decorator's handiwork.
The stamps used are from a varied
and extensive collection of all Na-
tionalities into the canvas which
hangs perpendicular, having intro-
duced nine ordinary colored peri-
odicals.
