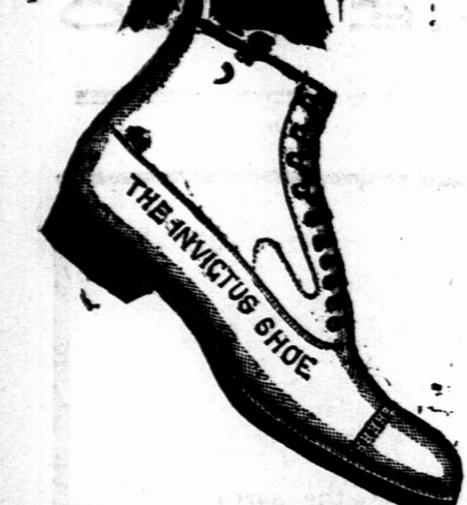

The state dinner takes place at 7 o'clock this evening and later there is a concert at Massey Hall.

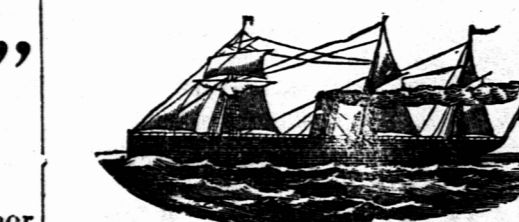
