—The following are the Alberton market prices:—White and black oats thirty-six to thirty-seven cents per bushel, butter eighteen to nineteen cents per lb, eggs twenty cents per doz, wool twenty cents per lb, pork eight to nine and a half cents per lb and hay (loose), nine dollars per ton.

—Summerside dealers, yesterday, were paying sixteen to eighteen cents a lb for butter, twenty cents a bus for potatoes, twenty cents a dozen for eggs, eight fifty a ton for loose hay and four fifty for straw, thirty eight to thirty nine cents a bus for oats and twenty cents a pound for wool.

—George N. Miller, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, at Summerside, and recently married to Miss Blizard, of this city, has tendered his resignation and intends removing to Rock Springs, Wyoming, having accepted the management there of the First National Bank of Wyoming.—St John Globe.

—The dredge boat Montague still continues the work of dredging at the town wharf. All ready she has already removed an enormous quantity of mud, sand and some pretty hard rock. The cut she has already made is over 200 feet in length and 60 feet broad, and quite deep enough for any ship that is likely to dock there.
