GREEK ARMY

by monthly shipments of 20,000 tons of cereals and dried fruits from Canada, guerrilla warfare is today the core of Greek life and is producing some amazing results.

The latest and most reliable estimates place 29 divisions, a third of them German and the rest Italian, in the region. German reinforcements continue to arrive, the latest report being that the Army Regiment was brought there from Sevastopol.

The Government in Athens is composed of Greeks of little consequence. They are completely in the hands of the Germans and do not command the least respect from people. Meanwhile the people wait with hope and faith—almost too much of both—for the day of deliverance which they are certain is near now.

CUTTING BRITISH CAKES

LONDON. (CP)—Cakes with icing and filling have been banned in Britain. The government has decreed that fancy cakes with synthetic cream and other things which people get in tea shops cannot be made.

Addressed Retailers Last Night

Shorter hours, equitable distribution, conservation of goods, and the four points stressed by Mr. W. A. Congdon, consultant of the Management Service Division of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, to a group of retailers at the Charlottetown last night.

Mr. Congdon is on a tour of the Maritime provinces in connection with his operations during war time. Tonight he will address retailers of Summerside and surrounding districts at 9:30 P.M. in the Town Hall.

His strongly worded appeal to the retailers present to get together and form a central organization to deal with plans for wartime operations was made by the speaker. The group would be in a position to keep a check on trends and approach the board with their difficulties. He particularly stressed the value of advertising during war time. In this connection he emphasized the necessity of retailers keeping their names before the public such as do manufacturers of consumer goods who are not manufacturing during wartime.

He gave as a reason for shorter hours the opportunity of giving clerks a rest in these trying times and stated that it would also serve to cut down operating expenses by conserving fuel, so necessary in the war effort.

Mr. Congdon also dealt at length with numerous other matters pertaining to retail operations. Following his address an interesting and beneficial round table discussion was entered into by the retailers present.

Mr. Jones said he believed that Island farmers would get practically all their requirements. Already some 5,000 tons more than last year have arrived in this Province. It was reported that the mixed fertilizers coming now will have less potash as that chemical is very scarce. A number of farmers are planting their potatoes without waiting for the fertilizer and planning to put it on top later.

Much Interest Taken In Forthcoming Meeting Of Maritime Hospital Ass'n.

On June 29 and 30 the Maritime Hospital Association is holding its annual meeting at the Cornwalls Inn at Kentville, N. S. Delegates from all of the hospitals including administrators and trustees will attend these sessions. Prominent hospital experts from other parts of Canada and from the United States will be present to join in the discussion and the round-table talks. There will be at this conference a large number of exhibitors such as firms which sell hospital supplies, drugs, scientific apparatus, etc. whose representatives and exhibits will demonstrate the latest improvements in such hospital equipment.

The Maritime Hospital Association is made up of 52 prominent hospitals of the Maritime Provinces. These hospitals were formerly associated into two organizations, the Hospital Association of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and the New Brunswick Hospital Association.

In 1942 these two organizations became one body. Its executive is made up of some of the prominent Maritime physicians, religious sisters, hospital administrators, and public spirited citizens. Its president is Dr. Joseph A. MacDonell, Charlottetown. Mr. A. Millan, Charlottetown, Mr. A. R. Young, Charlottetown, Mr. Royal N. S., has been field organizer for the past year, forming groups of subscribers throughout Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Dr. J. A. Income Tax Suggestions Made

OTTAWA, June 18—With a fair number of 1942 income tax returns already filed in the 19 districts of Canada, officials of the department of national revenue today made several suggestions which should help the remainder of the country's 2,000,000 taxpayers to complete their important duty well before June 30. Failure to meet this deadline brings a penalty of 5 per cent. of the full year's tax.

The purpose of the steps outlined today is to assist individuals in completing their forms and, if possible, avoid lengthy and unnecessary waiting in line while harassed assessors and cashiers try to cope with an eleventh-hour avalanche.

Handling 2,000,000 forms for a total of \$1,824,000,000 is a major task for 3,775 workers, yet all they ask is a little co-operation. In return they will give every assistance they can to the general public, many of whom are paying income tax for the first time.

The first and most vital step is to secure the proper form at the earliest possible moment from employer, post office or district inspector of income tax. The employ-
