SIR CHARLES TUPPER.

Sir Charles Tupper the other day took occasion to make a statement in the House of Commons to the effect that he is by no means so wealthy as many persons had been led to believe. He started in life, the son of a Baptist minister, with little of this world's goods save what was in himself. He had obtained a good education, to which was added a knowledge of medicine. He tells, what we can readily believe that he practised his profession for thirty years "with gratifying success," that he had no difficulty in securing all the practice he could handle, and that before he became Provincial Secretary of his province his medical practice gave him an income three or four times larger than the salary attached to the office referred to.

That Sir Charles possesses good business gifts and has been economical in his personal expenditures are statements which even his political opponents may admit to be true. What is new and to some extent surprising in his statement is that when he became Leader of the Opposition in 1896 "he found the income from his property was not sufficient for his maintenance and he was obliged to accept positions in connection with mining enterprises." We speak of this as surprising because most persons throughout Canada had supposed Sir Charles to be a much wealthier man than he has now described himself to be. We see no reason, however, to doubt the frank statement he has made and we accept it as quite true, and at the same time interesting.

Sir Charles has recently celebrated the forty-fifth anniversary of his entrance to public life, and in many respects has been one of the most fortunate of public men in that he has during the greater part of that time held important salaried public positions. But the holding of high positions carries with it the necessity of a much larger annual outlay than is required of men in private station. As Provincial Secretary it would cost him more to live than as Dr. Tupper in professional life, even though the official salary was but one third as great as had been the previous professional income. There is a lesson in this which may help the general public to better understand the monetary value of high official positions. Few of our public men save anything from their salaries and where they are possessed of some private fortune besides they almost invariably spend more from year to year than they receive from the country they serve.

That Sir Charles Tupper is the possessor of great abilities neither his friends nor his opponents are able to question. That he has rendered great services to Canada in regard to such great measures as the union of British North America and the transcontinental railway must on all hands be admitted. That he is and has been a devoted servant of Canada and the Empire is on all hands recognised. It is to his credit that he has frequently risen

above the position of a mere party leader and taken a broad and national view of the questions of the day, and that he loyally supported during the past and present years the policy of sending our soldiers to assist the Mother Country in the South African struggle and in bearing the large cost of that enterprise. If with all this to his credit he tells us that he is less wealthy than had been supposed by many and finds it necessary still to work for his maintenance, the people of Canada will abate none of their regard for him on that account.

An incident occurred a few weeks ago in the Commons on the occasion of the anniversary before referred to in this article, with which we may conclude. It was an incident which we would gladly see more frequently reproduced in our Provincial Legislatures, where the leader of one party paid a tribute of personal regard and respect to the opposing leader. On the occasion to which we refer Sir Wilfrid Laurier referred to Sir Charles Tupper's completion of forty five years of public life in terms that are highly creditable to both those distinguished leaders. He said:

"It is one of the blessings of political life that it is possible sometimes to forget that we are divided in opinion. It is one of the redeeming features of public life that, though our fights are keen and sometimes bitter, still, after all, we can realize that, beneath, or I should say above, that there are nobler sentiments that guide us. I am proud and glad to bear this testimony to the public career of my hon. friend and though I might take exception to it in many ways, it will live and live for the best in the history of Canada."

It seems to be generally admitted that the recent sudden death of Count Muravieff, Foreign Minister of Russia, is to be looked upon as an important and regrettable event. Very much depends in international relations upon the character and disposition of the Foreign Minister of an important and autocratic power like Russia. Count Muravieff was not only an exceedingly able and astute Minister of State, but was strongly disposed to maintain friendly relations with other powers, and he stood high in the confidence of the Czar. It will be exceedingly fortunate for Russia and the world if a successor is hereafter found who will be possessed of similar qualities, and some concern will be felt until that successor is named and as well approved as was Count Muravieff.

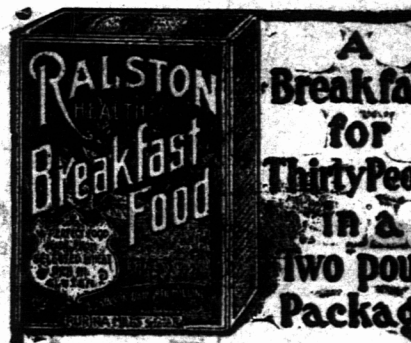
