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TALES TOLD BY MEN ON THE FIRING LINES ON LAND AND SEA

TRENCH TRIALS IN FLANDERS

A graphic account of his recent trying experiences in the trenches on the western front is given by Private P. A. Christian, a 15-year-old youth serving in the Royal Fusiliers, in a letter to his mother at Chorlton-cum-Hardy, Manchester, England. He writes: "The section of the line we held was notoriously one of the worst as regards discomfort, though the fighting owing to the nature of the ground, is mostly confined to the artillery and to snipers. The trenches, which are old German ones captured by the British, are built on an extensive marsh. They are merely parapets of sand bags which, as the water rises, becomes almost impossible to walk on. Before entering the trenches we put on rubber waders, which come well above the hips. As we entered the trenches we were amazed. If one slipped off the wooden planking it was into three feet of icy water at the bottom. The position of myself and Tellow as sentries was rather "windy" as a German sniper, had marked off the spot. One was exposed head and shoulders if one stood upright owing to the floor boards having been raised to escape the water. He had wounded two of the men we relieved the same night. Unfortunately we could not reply to his shots as our firing line was in front of us, and there was the danger of hitting our own men. Fortunately he did not hit either of us. Twenty-four hours after our occupation of the supports we advanced onto the firing line to relieve. Here was where the nightmare began. The only way was across the bog. Shell rations were everywhere feet deep. The mud was awful, tenacious, and sticky. We staggered, we fell, we stuck fast. Every time a star shell went up we stood rigid in order the better to escape the attentions of enemy snipers. Half-way across my wader came off, and in trying to get it on again I fell in a shell-hole up to the waist in water. I took the other boot off and did the rest of the journey in my stockings. Four days without sleep! When we arrived at our billets, men sank on the floor in their coats and equipment and slept at once. Their chums had to take off their wet things for them. Whatever we went through, I would not have missed it.

I may mention that I found it in the course of my calling as a fisherman on the shores of Molins Bay, Marazion, opposite St. Michaels Mount. OUR IMPREGNABLE LINE

Heavy losses by the Huns in their recent attacks on our forces are spoken of by ex-Councillor John Hayes, of Salford, England, in a letter from the front to his wife in Manchester. He writes: "It was simply grand this morning to witness the way our air fleet met the German raid over our quarters. For two solid hours more than a dozen airships circled around us, throwing bombs every few minutes into our midst. Then a rush of wind brought the sound of pom-pom, and I saw a flight of our own latest battleplanes whirling along in a glorious sunshine from my window. The reports came and less than one hour the enemy aircraft was driven away. Of course, cannot say what happened, but it was a glorious victory for our air-fleet. We have also had an enemy attack along our line. There has been great slaughter, and from the reports coming in I have no hesitation in saying that we have cut up the Germans in fearful numbers as a result of their onslaught on us. In my opinion it is impossible for anything to break our line of defence here.

"PALS" NARROW ESCAPE

Writing to his mother in Ancoats Private John Jones, one of the Manchester "Pals" tells how the men were shelled by the Germans as they paid their first visit to the firing line. He writes: "We arrived back from the trench safe and sound after rather an exciting experience. This happened in the afternoon as we arrived at the village. From there we entered the communication trenches to the position. Whether the Germans could tell that we were there I do not know. He met his death facing the enemy, and fighting like the heroes he and his comrades have time and again proved themselves to be. It is of such men as he that Canada and the whole of the British Empire have reason to be proud. It was a dangerous undertaking for which he volunteered, namely a raiding party into the enemy's trenches, and he gladly offered himself for that purpose. With your sorrow, you will so many that the men who have every reason to be proud of the son who sacrificed himself for his country. 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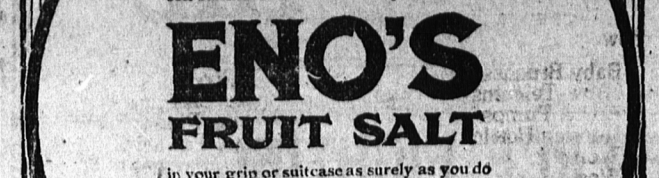
