NEW SHOWROOMS.—Mr. H.W. Downing has secured another very important contract, that of the erection of an automobile showroom, office and warehouse on Water street, Summerside, for W. B. Prowse & Sons, Ltd. of Charlottetown. The site for this building is on the corner of land opposite the Journal Office, lately owned by Mr. B. I. Rayner. This latest addition to Summerside's business thoroughfare will have a ground area of 37x70 feet from plans submitted by Mr. Downing. Work on the foundation of this building is expected to commence at an early date.

BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS.—At a meeting of the Parish Hall Committee of St. Mary's Church, held at the residence of Mrs. H. C. Mills, Summerside, on Tuesday evening, it was decided to proceed with the construction of a parochial hall building to cost in the vicinity of \$9,000 complete. It will be built according to plans and specifications prepared by Mr. H. M. Downing. Work will proceed at once, and it is expected to have the building completed on contract time, December 15. The new hall will be a rectangular building, 38x75 feet, with an entrance porch 5x10 feet, facing on Summer street. It will contain a stage, two dressing rooms, auditorium, ladies' parlor, entrance hall, kitchen and class rooms. It will be of frame construction with concrete foundation to be covered with asphalt slates, both roof and sides. The interior will be finished in British Columbia fir. Mr. Downing prepared an excellent plan which meets admirably all the purposes of a parochial hall.

Old Country Gives Attention To Women Settlers

(Canadian Press) LONDON, August 24. — With so many schemes for settlement of boys and young men in the dominions; how about women settlers? There is obvious danger in a lopsided development of migration and, now that schemes for settling boys in their teens on the land have come to take rank as the most promising of all, that danger is more real than ever.

The leading organization in training for overseas life, and one which is doing invaluable work in this regard, is the Society for Overseas Settlement of British Women. But an encouraging feature is the establishment by the Lancashire County Council of a scheme for training girls as settlers. This is an experiment marked by thoroughness and consequent expense, providing for a year's training for each girl. It is being urged that less financially-strong organizations might provide two or three months' training.

The obvious difficulty in migration of women as against male settlers, is that the inducements for women are less than those extended to their brothers. At present the Dominions declare they need "household workers" and the prospect of going half across the world to wield a scrubbing brush is not so enticing.

It is the aim now to train English girls not for domestic life in the dominions, but for country life, as the wives of farmers. Town girls cannot easily learn the things that separate the country household from the town one, and where the woman has been given no chance to acquaint herself with conditions on training farms, she will gravitate naturally to the overseas town.

Concerning the strict qualifications requested by dominion officials in connection with women migrants, The Times says: "We can understand what seems at times the over-exacting attitude of Dominion officials in taking to themselves the future mothers of their people. The S.O.S. B.W. has for many years now worked to correct wrong impressions, whether over-sanguine or over-pessimistic. Its primary preoccupation is with those who need assistance to settle; but women who can pay their way are not less in need of accurate information and friendly services."

Today, when the overwhelming majority of schemes financed under the Empire Settlement Act have no place for the married man, the Society is chiefly concerned with women going out on their own account. Much of its work is exceedingly un-spectacular. It is as important to prevent unsuitable women from going as it is to make it easy for suitable ones to go. A number of practices are in existence today to test this suitability. Girls can be examined free in the different sorts of work which will be expected of them. A beginning has been made by the Australian Government at Market Harbor, as well as by the Lancashire County Council on their own initiative—in providing training of the right kind. Such training aims at laying the foundations at least of competence in the various ranges of activities that marks the happy wife of the farmer.

EGG LAYING COMPETITION

Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest for the 42nd Week, ended August 21, 1927

There was considerable improvement in production for the week, the total eggs laid being 704, as compared with 612 for the preceding week. The total eggs laid to date are 27,770.

Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns led for the week with 52.2 points; Mrs. J. F. Easton's White Leghorns were second with 49.5 points; Mr. H.C. Muttart's Barred Rocks were third, with 44.6 points; John L. Clark's Barred Rocks were fourth, with 41.4 points; M. Cullis's Barred Rocks were fifth, with 40.4 points; and Glen McLaren's Barred Rocks were sixth, with 39.9 points.

Mr. H.C. Muttart's Barred Rocks lead the contest to date, with 1879.4 points; Mrs. J. F. Easton's White Leghorns are second, with 1663.5 points; Mrs. Alex. Hamilton's Barred Rocks are third, with 1632.2 points; Clifford McEwen's Barred Rocks are fourth, with 1578.1 points; Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns are fifth, with 1556.7 points; and William Coughlan's Barred Rocks are sixth, with 1480.7 points.

Official Doings At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Ont. Aug. 27.—Gradually members of the Government who have been absent abroad are returning to the Capital. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Representative of Dominion of Canada at the official opening at the New Australian capital and later at the Geneva Disarmament conference was back at his desk in the justice department this morning. About Geneva, Mr. LaPointe had nothing to say until he confers with the Prime Minister. He expects to get in touch with Mr. King in the near future. Hon. Lucien Cannon, solicitor general, has been acting Minister of Justice during the absence of Mr. LaPointe. Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, will return from overseas early in September. He is expected to land at Quebec about the third of next month. Matters which will occupy his attention between now and the end of the year include about one hundred millions of maturing loans of the Dominion Government. Whether it will be necessary to raise further money to meet these maturities or whether they will be paid remains to be seen. Premier MacKenzie King will pay a visit to the constituency of North Huron next Thursday when Hon. James Malcolm, Minister of Trade and Commerce will also speak. The by-election there necessitated by the death which took place the last session of Mr. John W. King takes place on Sept. 12. Premier King and Mr. Malcolm will speak at Goodrich and at Winnipeg.

COPPER DEPOSITS IN CANADA

Copper ores of various kinds, including the native metal are found at many places throughout Canada. Production has so far been confined to the following areas in order of their importance: British Columbia, Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba,

and Yukon. Deposits of copper or its compounds are also known in the Maritime Provinces, and in the Arctic regions of Canada. The Arctic de-

posits, although at present inaccessible, possibly constitute one of the great copper-ore reserves of the future.
