PROPERTY SALE.—The Gillis property at the corner of Great George and Dorchester Streets was sold at auction yesterday by Mr. R. Bearisto and was bought by Mr. Joseph McCarey for the sum of \$5,425.

QUARTERLY MEETING.—The Quarterly Official Board met on Monday evening in Vernon River Methodist Church. The reports of the various departments of the church's activities was encouraging. The Sunday services of public worship are well attended both at Vernon River and Cherry Valley. The finances were also very satisfactory, and showed what could be accomplished by a people determined to make their church self-sustaining. Only three years ago they were receiving help from the Mission funds. This year they paid their pastor—Rev. Henry A. Brown \$770 above incidentals. The contributions to the Conventional Fund were in advance of last year, as were also the missionary offering both of the churches and the Women's Missionary Auxiliary. Great credit is due to the earnest and enthusiastic manner in which the members of the church and the congregation have supported their pastor in his labors. They anticipate that the new year upon which they are now entering will continue to witness a healthy growth. It was unanimously agreed by the Quarterly Official Board that the Cherry Valley Methodist Church shall on the first Sunday of each month be given the morning and evening services—and Vernon River an afternoon service. Mr. Lawson Jenkins was appointed Sunday School Superintendent of Vernon River. Mr. J. Frank Jenkins was appointed a Steward, also delegate to the Annual District Meeting to be held in York.

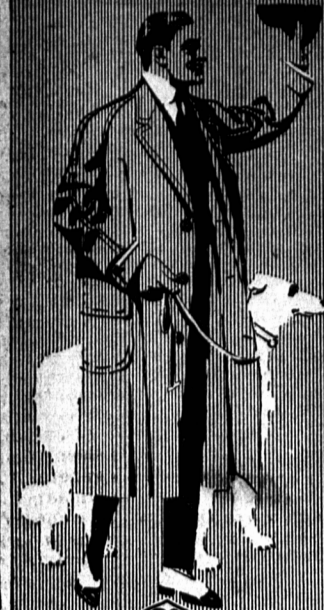
