FOR LUNCHEON "CHICKEN CUTLETS"

Take from fire and add one pint of cold chopped chicken, a tablespoon of parsley, one teaspoon of salt, a little pepper and a grating of nutmeg. Boil for five minutes, then cool. When cold form into the shape of cutlets and dip in egg and crumbs and dry.
