...BAPTIST W. M. S. — The monthly meeting of the Baptist Women's Missionary Society met at the home of Mrs. D. J. MacLean on Wednesday afternoon, March 4. Meeting opened with singing of hymn "Trust and Obey". Scripture reading from Psalm 84, was read by president, Mrs. J. G. Duncan led in prayer followed by Lords Prayer in unison. The study of Our Home Mission work was continued. Mrs. J. G. Duncan read a very interesting paper entitled "Thirty Years at New Liskeard in Northern Ontario". Previous to 1900 this part of Ontario was unbroken forest. About this date the lumbermen starting cutting the trees. Following the broken trails Rev. Wm. Peer was sent out by Home Mission Board. He started his work in a tent on the banks of the Wabigoon River. The first church building was erected in 1901 and from this point the church continued to grow under inspiring and soul winning clergymen. **GAY ACCENT**

This year, it's especially important to keep your home looking bright and cheerful. In practically no time at all, you can introduce a bright note by stitching up gaily-coloured sofa cushions — purposefully patriotic, just plain sentimental or purely utilitarian. Your sewing centre can instruct you in use of your sewing machine attachment. You can buy inexpensive bolster moulds in all shapes and sizes and cover them with plain cotton fabrics if your sofa has a striped or patterned cover, or use floral or printed cottons if the sofa is upholstered in a plain fabric. Heart-shaped cushions strike a sentimental note if you like. Use the ruffler attachment on a straight strip of fabric to edge heart with evenly shirred fluffy ruffles.

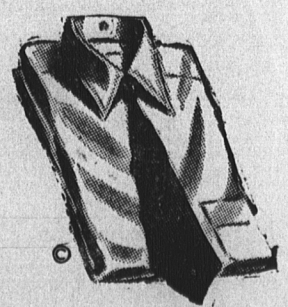

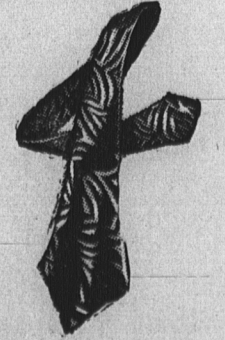
