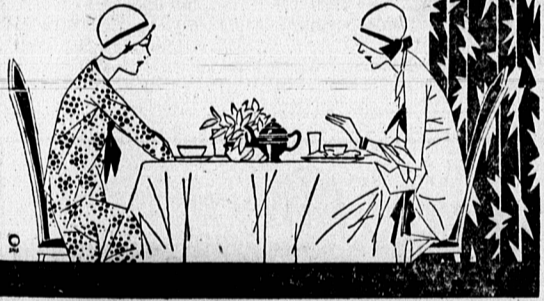

### PRESENTATION AT BRADALBANE

At the evening service in the United Church, Bradalbane, on May 31, 1931, Mr. Hugh F. MacKay, was tendered an address of appreciation and presented with a copy of the new Hymnary of the United Church in Canada in recognition of his service as Sunday School superintendent. The pastor, Rev. Thos. Paletnorpe, in behalf of the congregation, made the presentation.

The following is the address:—

Dear Mr. MacKay:—

It is with feelings of deep regret that we, parents and teachers, learned of your resignation as Superintendent of our Sunday School. Throughout the fourteen years during which you were associated with our Sunday School, you have been most faithful to the obligations laid upon you, by virtue of your office, often travelling over bad roads in winter time, at what must have been great inconvenience and discomfort in order to be at your desk to greet your scholars. As to your work no human mind can tabulate its effect upon the scholars during those fourteen years of loyal service.

However, we found one redeeming feature connected with your resignation, which made it easier to accept and that was that you were not giving up the work of the Sunday School altogether, but that you were assuming a similar position at Pleasant Valley, where you will not have to travel quite so far to greet your scholars.

We are asking you to accept this copy of "The Hymnary" as emblematic of our esteem and gratitude, with the prayer that you may long be spared to continue your work amongst the young folk of the church.

"Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these, my children, ye did it unto me."
