LONDON, Dec. 24.—The Evening News publishes a cable from its correspondent at Madrid, Spain, stating that the Royal Bank of Canada in Barcelona has drawn a prize of £2,920,000 (460,000) in the great Spanish Christmas lottery. The total amount subscribed in connection with the lottery, the Evening News' correspondent says, was £4,000,000,000 (\$20,000,000) of which the Spanish Treasury will take £1,500,000 (\$7,500,000).
