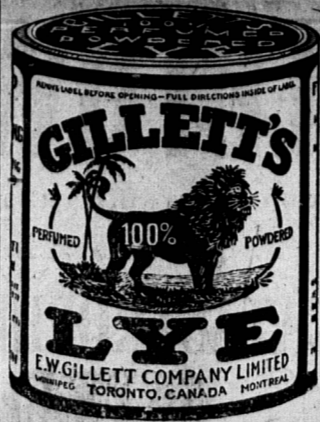

The athletic sports at the C. A. A. Grounds on Wednesday were undoubtedly the most keenly contested on this track for several years, and all the competitors are to be congratulated on trying so hard to give the large number of spectators present such a fine exhibition of good clean, manly sport. And judging from the comments on all sides, track sports seem to be gaining their old time popularity.

The 100 yds. was a fine exhibition of speed, between Doyle, Hooper, Younker and Kelly, the first named winning out in good style.

The Pole Vault was another interesting event and called for much applause from the spectators as each competitor has a very pretty style of jumping and no doubt, better things will be heard from these young athletes before long.

Young Jamison, "The Boy Wonder" certainly deserves the highest praise for the plucky fight he put up in the 1/4 mile run. The winner of this event was a Harvard University man, Robertson from Montague, who returned recently from New York where he served for the past two years in the U. S. A. Navy. Hooper put up a great fight, but lacked training for this event.

The Bicycle events were all interesting and much enjoyed. Prowse deserves credit for the comeback he made in the 1/4, 1/2 and mile races, he has the speed yet, but Walker appears to be the strongest driver, Mr. Pherson, McLeod, Prowse and Gaudet put up a good race for being only new at the game.

The half mile was one of the fastest seen on this track for some time, Hall, of Amherst winning, coming within two seconds of the track record.

The Broad and Running High Jumps also showed up some fine material for future meets, McEachern is a very neat jumper and no doubt with a little training will be hard to beat, Mullen in the high jump showed up well and was a easy winner at 5 ft. 4 inches.

The sports were late in starting, which meant that people going home by train were compelled to leave the grounds before the fun was over, however they were run off as quickly as possible, but the Band not being in attendance was quite a disappointment to both competitors and spectators.

Another thing that would make sports much more interesting from the spectators point of view is a program of events and each starter to carry a number to correspond with the number on the program, however this is something to remember in the future.

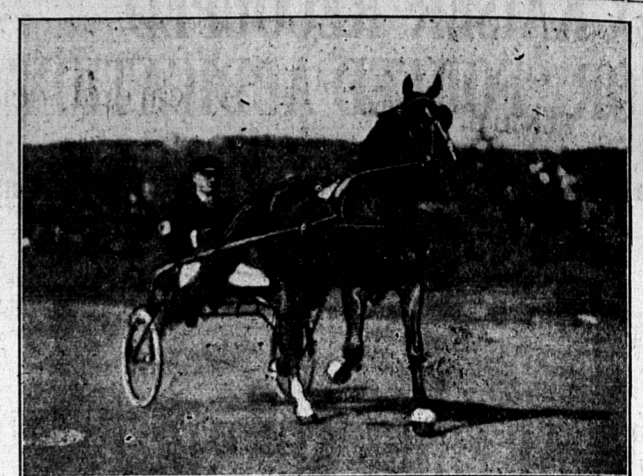
