

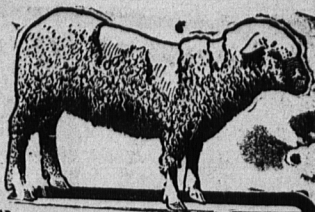

SCHOOL MEETING.—At Earnslcliffe annual school meeting the sum of \$86 was voted for contingent expenses, \$30 for supplement. Mr. Neil Praught, J.P., the retiring trustee, was re-elected. It was decided to coat the outside of the school this year with paint, instead of whitewash. The present teacher, Mr. Chas. Trainor, was elected for another year.

ST JAMES MANSE.—At a meeting of the congregation of St James Church last evening, Colonel Stewart presiding, it was agreed to proceed with alterations and improvements on the Manse, and the Trustees were authorised to accept tenders in the vicinity of \$5,000. The architects are Messrs Chappell & Hunter, and the contract is to be carried out on a ten per cent. basis.

SEND FOR IT.—"Weeds and Weed Seeds Illustrated and Described" is the name of Bulletin No. S-8, issued by the Seed Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. Its aim is to present in convenient form for reference the essential matters contained in "Farm Weeds," the second edition of which is now out of print. Much new information is added, and the bulletin will meet the needs of many of our farmers, but more particularly of the school teachers who, in introducing Nature Study in their schools, have been at a loss to know where to secure a book of this kind. This pamphlet completely fills the bill, and every teacher in the Province should send for it to the Publication Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

FOX MEN MEET.—A fairly large meeting of members and committees of the Prince Edward Island Fox Breeders' Association was held in the Secretary's office last evening for the purpose of mapping out the summer's work of the Association, completing the organization and arranging for a wider publicity. The printed matter for registration and enrolment and for the admission of members is all practically ready and work along these lines will be begun in the near future. Reports from practically all the ranches indicate a fair production and a distinctly optimistic feeling among ranchers. It is understood that the majority of foxmen will this year offer only a small proportion of their young foxes, believing it more profitable to add these to their breeding stock.

AUTO RIDE.—Last night the choir of the Baptist Church was entertained by the Ladies' Aid Society to an automobile ride and luncheon in appreciation of the excellent musical service rendered by the choir. A short time previously Mrs. Bruce Stewart also extended the hospitality of her home to the choir in a delightful social evening. Automobiles last evening were kindly given by Messrs W. B. Prowse, Walter Grant, W. K. Rogers and Bruce Stewart.

AGRICULTURAL MEETING.—On Wednesday evening Prof. Ross addressed an agricultural meeting at Belle River Schoolhouse, taking up the subjects of the cost of the produc-

tion of the various crops, the feeding of cattle, and the building up of the soil. Particular emphasis was placed on securing the largest possible crop from all the ground worked. Considerable discussion ensued. The attendance was fair. Prof. Ross states that crops in this vicinity are more advanced than in some other sections. The indications are that the hay crop will be much above average, and all other crops are doing splendidly.

BROKEN INTO.—Some criminal person on Wednesday night broke into J. J. Gay & Co.'s stand in the Market building and stole 4 dozen bananas, some candy and one dollar. The thieves made their entrance by the roof of a porch on the south side and raising a window or coming down the stairway exit on the same side leading from the theatre above. It is claimed that the windows on this side of the building are often left unfastened and to anyone desiring it is a simple matter to climb up on the porch over the bowling alley entrance and get in, and it is equally easy to get in by way of the exit stairs. This is a condition of affairs which certainly requires immediate attention. The entrance into Mr. Gay's compartment was made by removing a pane of glass and knock-

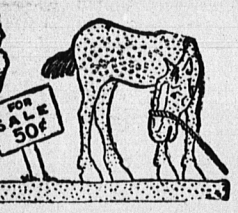

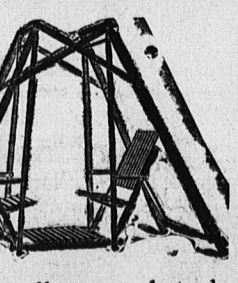

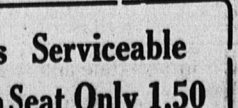
