

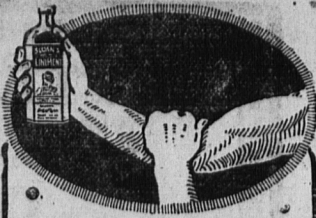

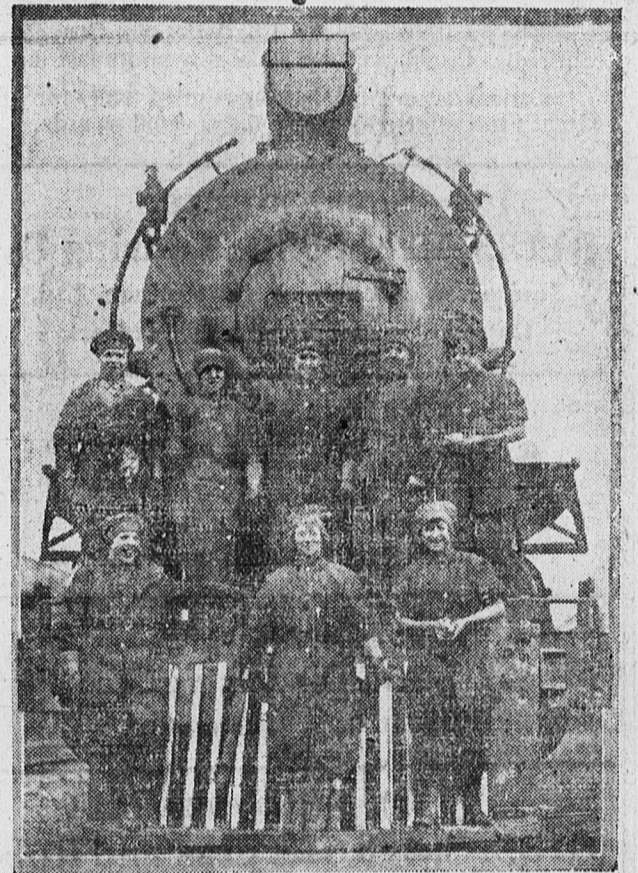

Cardigan Meeting Largely Attended

(Continued from page one.)

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier was opposed to conscription and asked if there would be an appeal to the people. Sir Robert Borden was willing to meet Laurier in any way in order to effect the union and said he would pass the Act and then go to the people—all that you could expect from any leader. This offer was refused.

"The Canadian Club of Hamilton asked Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier to go to the country in a recruiting appeal. Sir Robert Borden was in England at the time but immediately cabled that this would be his party thought was for the good of the country. And Sir Wilfrid Laurier—what did Sir Wilfrid do? After some delay he wrote that he could not give assurance at that time but would take up the matter later—and the matter is still under advisement.

"It was absolutely necessary to bring in the Military Service Act. It is not an election dodge for it is apparent to the common sense of anyone that conscription is decidedly not a popular move and would do more harm than help to any person or party advocating it.

"There were 26 Liberals who voted for the Military Service Bill—but Mr. J. J. Hughes was not one of the 26—rather than vote for what the leaders of his party thought was for the good of Canada and the Empire. Mr. Hughes voted against the bill.

"The Bill was passed but Sir Robert Borden did not lose his ideal, his determination to have a Union Government, as he thought that for best results from the Act it would be better to have both parties united. After a great deal of work, patience and perseverance, he finally accomplished the seemingly impossible and formed the Union Government—made up of men of both parties—which is now asking the country for its support. In that government are several of the 26 loyal Liberals who assented to the Military Service Bill including the Premier of Alberta, Hon. A. L. Sifton, a member from Saskatchewan, Hon. J. A. Calder, a member from Manitoba, Hon. J. A. Crerar, a member from Halifax, Mr. A. K. McLean, (Sir Robert Borden's opponent at the last election) and the Hon. Hugh Guthrie and Frank Carvell.

"The issue boils itself down to one simple question: are you willing that Canada will stand up to the end or are you going to quit as Russia has quit? You are either going to send men to back the Canadians at the front or you are not—that is all there is to it. Why, when you read the papers when these horrible telegrams come when you realize the brave men who have paid the supreme sacrifice—when you realize what the number of men who have been wounded and maimed now in the hospital, are going through—almost unthinkable agony—when you realize what these brave men have done and more are going to do. If the army is going to be gradually reduced and reduced and reduced.

"It all comes down to the question: Are you going to let these men die in vain? Or are you going to rise like true Britons and send men to help them?

"That is what this election means. We say we are going to send men—the Leader of the Opposition says he is going to have a referendum and I wish to tell you you could not possibly work out a referendum and have men on the firing line by Xmas of 1918.

"No matter what the result of this campaign will be I can look my family in the face, I can look my neighbors in the face, I will be able to look the brave Canadian thousands from Carleton and Victoria, in the face whenever they come back and when the end comes at last, I at least will not have the burden on my soul that I sold my country out when the enemy was at the gate."

"Mr. Hughes talks of munitions deals and profiteering. Profiteering is not involved in the present election. The Imperial Government of Great Britain wanted \$400,000,000 worth of munitions. She made the price and left the rest to a committee. Though working at a disadvantage that committee had the munitions delivered before the contract time and at a price \$40,000 below the terms of the contract.

tee. Though working at a disadvantage that committee had the munitions delivered before the contract time and at a price \$40,000 below the terms of the contract. "There have been charges against Robert Rogers and Sir Sam Hughes. Both of these men were dismissed by Sir Robert Borden who punished and dismissed any wrong-doer without hesitation—which was more than Laurier ever did. When Sam Hughes was employed by the Government there were not words vile enough for the Liberals to call him and they were proud when he got into trouble. But after the trouble had died down the Liberals fell upon his neck—"Oh Sir Sam, all we said about you is false." If he had joined arms with the party he would have been the Liberals' white-haired boy. (Laughter and applause.) "It is foolish for any person to say that all the fault is on one side. The Liberals had done some good while in power—possibly by accident. (Laughter.) "There is a good deal of misleading talk circulated by Liberal parties to influence the votes of our lady friends. But I say this to you—VOTE TO SUPPORT YOUR SOUVREIGN BROTHERS YOUR HUSBANDS AT THE FRONT AND VOTE THAT RELIEF MAY GO TO HIM SPEEDILY.

"The Liberals almost cry over the disfranchising of enemy aliens but they (the Liberals) disfranchised local office holders at one time so that the Liberal party might have a clear vote. The Germans in Canada owe their first allegiance to the fatherland—no matter what is said to the contrary—and why should they be given a vote that might mean a deciding factor in the great war which your kin and loyal Canadians are now fighting? (Applause.) The women of Canada are called upon now to send relief at short notice to their blood and kin over in the trenches by voting for the Union Win-the-War Government. This is a vote for the honor of our land, our liberty, the safety of your brothers, sons and husbands and a glorious work for you to be engaged in.

"When the Military Service Act was passed there was already a compulsory Military Service law on the statute books. This Act was passed in 1878 and amended in 1896 by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. By its provisions any man from 18 to 60 years of age could be called for military service anywhere in defence of Canada. The selection was by ballot—and no matter who the man was, what his duties or circumstances—the last member of a family—the sole support of a home—he had to go if he drew the ballot.

"UNDER THE SELECTIVE DRAFT SYSTEM NO MAN WHO CANNOT BE SPARED WILL BE ASKED TO GO FORWARD. The producers—the men needed at the fishing nets and on the farms—these will remain at home.

In closing Mr. McLean appealed for the support of his hearers, saying that the people formed the government and if elected he would live up to the duty and honor of being the voice of the people of Kings County and their servant in the higher House of Parliament.

His address was a clear, concise, scholarly statement of facts, splendidly delivered and was most favourably received by the large audience. Mr. J. J. Hughes followed. He took up again the role of a political critic and corrector of abuses. He spoke for an hour and a half, forty-five minutes of which was used in advertising The Guardian. The other 45 minutes he devoted to a criticism of the Militia and Finance Departments in which his audience appeared to be little interested. He rode all the legendary horses sold to the government, fired volleys from the abused Ross Rifle and swathed his hearers with the bandages which figured in some of the earlier scandals and generally wore out the patience of his hearers.
