accuracy of returns of three polls and the district was left in abeyance until the deputy returning officers of the polls brought to Charlottetown. The official declaration may be made possibly today.

Figures for the First District of Queen's County were not declared because neither electors or the candidates were present when the returns were compiled yesterday. However, unofficial returns gave the two Liberal candidates, W. F. Alan Stewart and Donald N. McKay such a commanding lead there was no doubt their election would be declared.

The remaining three districts of Queen's County saw four Liberals and two Conservatives declared elected. In the third district, Liberals Hon. Frank R. McGuigan and Mr. Russell C. Clark polled majorities of 352 and 390, respectively, over their Conservative opponents. In the fourth district Liberals Walter Jones and Douglas MacKinnon polled majorities of 35 and 295.

Fifth District, Charlottetown and Royston, saw the leader of the Conservative Party, Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan and his colleague, Mr. W. A. Stewart, declared elected. Dr. MacMillan polled a majority of 418 votes over his Liberal opponent, and son-in-law, C. St. C. Trainor, while W. A. Stewart marked up a majority of 911 over Hon. T. W. L. Prowse, member without portfolio of Premier Campbell's Government.

TRAPPEE THEN MET MERCIFUL, SWIFT DEATH

U. S. Navy Will Salvage Submarine Squalus After Towing It To Shallower Water.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., May 25 - (AP) - The United States navy's high command gave orders tonight to press salvage operations on the half-sunken submarine Squalus throughout the week, revealing simultaneously they hoped to tow the craft toward shallower water before raising her or taking out all the bodies of the dead.

Describes Emigration Of Royal Court BY LEON EDEL Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, May 25 - An instance of royal immigration on a large scale—when a whole European royal family settled in South America—was recounted in a series of articles published tonight before a joint meeting of the Canadian Historical and Political Science Associations at McGill University.

Herbert Heaton, professor of economic history at the University of Minnesota, described how the Portuguese court emigrated from Lisbon to Brazil in the winter of 1607-08, during the great game of international strategy played between Britain and Napoleon.

When the royal family reached Brazil no palace was available, but the king and queen were united to provide a makeshift royal residence. The harbor possessed only two barges for conveying goods from ship to shore. The king was like a comic opera character and the whole colony was shabby, dirty and down-at-the-heel.

Professor Heaton said that during his 18 years' stay at Rio as a resident, he had seen the royal immigrant John changed many of these conditions and laid the foundations of the present city and nation.

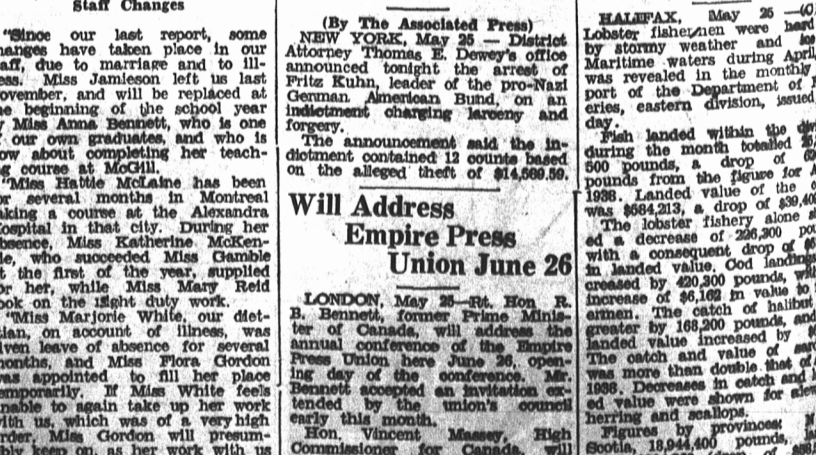

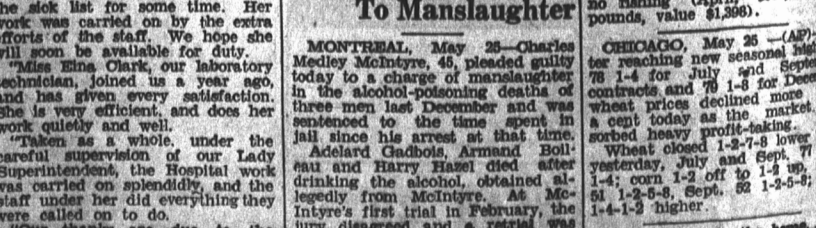
