—LARGELY ATTENDED FUNERALS.—The funerals of the late Peter Gaudet and John M. Doucette at Palmer Road this week were well attended, showing that both had been highly esteemed during their life-time.—Z.

—PATRIOTIC CELEBRATION AT TIGNISH.—In honour of "St. Patrick's Day" the members of the A.O.H. Society and all true followers and believers in the sanctity of this great day in Tignish, celebrated the day on Wednesday. There was a Solemn High Mass in Tignish Catholic Church in the morning and a concert in A.O.H. Hall in the evening. High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Monsignor D. M. MacDonald, assisted by the full choir, which gave special music. The sermon of the day was delivered by Father J. F. Johnston, assistant pastor of Palmer Road Parish Church, who had been specially invited to speak on the life of this great Apostle. Taking as his text: "And the Lord said to Abraham: go forth out of thy country and from thy kindred, and out of thy father's house, and come into the land which I shall show thee." (Gen. xii. 1.) This well-known orator and scholar spoke at length from the early history of Ireland up to its present condition, and also on the life of St. Patrick, from his first venture into Erin when that country was nothing but a people worshipping the things of nature and knew nothing of Christ and His mission on earth, up to the time of his death, which, as it is chronicled, brought the "Emerald Isle" into a country known the world over as a God-fearing one and all due to the zeal and noble work of this servant of God. The brief space available will be inadequate to give even the salient points brought out by the speaker. St. Patrick one day appeared before St. Celestine the First, then the reigning Pope, and told him that he was from a far western country, in

which he had been kept a prisoner, but had managed to escape; that he was anxious to return to that country to bring his captors under the yoke of the true religion of Jesus Christ. The head of the Catholic Church was so much impressed by this man's sincerity that he gave him full authority to go and preach the Christian doctrine to them, who, as he was told, worshipped idols. St. Patrick, after much travel, landed among the Irish people once more and on its soil planted the Cross and began preaching and from that day forth idolatry melted away and virtues of every kind budded, bloomed and flourished throughout the length and breadth of the land. After this Saint's death Ireland still flourished under the Christian yoke, but was destined to receive a wellnigh fatal shock in the year 795, when the Danes landed and started to plunder and wage war on the true religion of the religion of Christ. For over three hundred years this invasion continued and at last, at the hands of Bryen, the shores of Dublin Bay were purged with the blood of the vanquished invaders. Then again for over a century Ireland was under Christian rule, only to again encounter another set back by different rulers in the Mediaeval Ages, who tried on divers occasions to break the faith of the Irish people from their allegiance to Christianity. But through all these persecutions the followers of the true religion adhered to the early teachings of their Apostle, and so strong was their faith that it became recognised the world over and to day its exiles have caused the Cross, which is the true emblem of Christianity, to throw its shadows upon all parts of the civilised world. The splendid show of respect for the veneration of this day, dear to all the sons of Erin, given by the large body of the A.O.H. Society, who together marched up to the sanctuary rail and received communion, was a splendid tribute to the organisation.—Z.
