—IMPRESSIONS OF THE WEST—Mr. John A. Hynes, Kensington, who spent the last ten months in the Canadian West, returned home recently, most favourably impressed with the boundless possibilities in that country. Last August Mr. Hynes, believing that a respite from the continuously strenuous work on the farm, would be an advantage both physically and mentally, made such arrangements at home as would relieve him of domestic duties for a brief space, and set out for the great Canadian West. His first pause on the journey was in Calgary, where he was met and warmly greeted by his daughter, Mary and his son, Dr. Storey. He visited all the places of interest in the vicinity of Calgary, and thence he made a brief call at the Government Experimental Farm at Lacombe. This farm is most beautifully situated, has an extensive area and comprises the best soil in that area. It is cultivated according to the latest scientific principles and the results attained are most satisfactory. It is visited by all people within easy reach, and by many strangers. The influence of the good work performed and of the practical results achieved must exercise a beneficial power upon the people. These people are moving ahead with other countries throughout the world in the march of educational advancement. They are building two large schools to accommodate the ever increasing number of pupils. The school officials, employ the very best teachers, and some of these claim Prince Edward Island to be the home of their birth, their education, and their ambitious potentialities. They find it difficult in qualifying in the normal course that must be taken to become eligible to teach. He found the West well served in principles of religion and learned of the good work performed by clergymen who with just pride proclaim Prince Edward Island to be the land of their birth. My Hynes believes that conditions in some parts of the West are not such as to attract permanent residence, some of them being disposed of as soon as independence will warrant, and location made elsewhere. It is evident that if the industrial opportunities found in the West, could be added to the intellectual and spiritual advantages actually existing in the East, our people would be perfectly willing to determine permanent residence here. This emphasizes the truth that our own island youth should make every effort here to advance the successful march of progress to the end that the most desirable results may be attained. Although Mr. Hynes correctly appreciates the industrial activity and the growing possibilities of the West, yet he is firmly convinced that if our young men who have the true spirit of patriotism dominating their being, they would remain at home and would make our own Province such a scene of prosperity as would attract the people from the West to visit us and to be highly edified by the example that our own Prince Edward Island people are able to display. conditions in the country were much better before this act went into force than at the present time, that the act is difficult to enforce. Also that the proposed act is much misrepresented. He gave in detail the clauses of the act and told how they could be carried out, thus doing away with much of the drinking of poisonous substances and other evils. He then gave the reasons for changing the act. The present act does not prohibit. It cannot be enforced because the people are not behind it. We must get clear of the evils that have come in the train of the prohibition act. He declared his party to be just as strongly in favor of prohibition as any Liberal but they wanted liquor controlled so as to get clear of the menace which it becomes when abused. A glance at the act shows that bar-rooms cannot be opened on every corner as some of our opponents claim will be done. He then reviewed conditions in Quebec and read letters from prominent men of Western provinces to show that gov't. control is really for the good of the province. As the speaker's allotted time was up he concluded by thanking the people for their kind reception of him.

Mr. Horace Wright then took up some of the matters dealt with by Mr. Lowther and got out to show how the Bell gov't. had been much more economical than the Stewart administration and showed how the Bell gov't. had reduced the indebtedness of the country. The Stewart government took off the poll tax and put the tax on those who were already overtaxed, the car owner, incidentally the farmer. He then brought up the temperance question. He asked where the policy came from, and stated that prominent temperance men waited upon Mr. Stewart and asked him for a plebiscite, which he refused to grant. He appealed to the people to be fair saying they could not vote for the Conservative party and at the same time be fair to themselves, their families or their country. He gave quotations to show the leading brewers and distillers were helping the provincial governments to bring in government control because of the increased sale of intoxicants.

In reply to repeated calls from the audience for their platform he gave the first plank of it, but was unable to give more because his time had expired.

Mr. Louis Howatt next took the floor and the welcome he received declared it to be the popularity which he has in this section of the country. And, judging by the applause which he received through his speech, his debut into political life is well received by the people of this section.

He stated that this was his first political meeting and he felt that perhaps he was somewhat behind his Liberal friends for they have been holding political meetings every Sunday for some time past. He stated that some people claim that the Stewart Government got the subsidy which is flouted so much by mere luck. He said it is far better to have a lucky government which will go after things, than an unlucky one which will not. He further stated, Mr. Wright claims the Guardian has changed, we will find that Mr. Wright himself has changed. When first he was heard he was berating the Liberals but now he is backing them up. Mr. Wright told us how much liquor could be got—government stores, but he didn't tell us how much can be got on the Island today at every cross-road. When I was young I could go to a skating rink and not see such a thing as liquor. Last winter at our skating rink there were people peddling the stuff. Is that prohibition? He denied the statements that bar-rooms or vend. shops will be opened up in every village. They will not be opened without the consent of the majority of the residents of that district. He also said prohibition has brought with it all manner of vice: law breaking, perjury etc., and is ruining many young men on the Island. In the propaganda our opponents are putting out they are such like by describing the drunk on condition which at all times they will be in. We do not follow such a policy. He then told of a certain leader who hoped to get into power, in a province where government control was in effect, by bringing back temperance and that fellow was snowed under so far that he hasn't recovered yet. He quoted statements made by Rev. Mr. Raymond regarding the conditions of Charlottetown under prohibition. That there drunkenness is more common than in any other city of Canada. He told of the condition in U.S.A. under prohibition, how in Chicago they have machine gun fights between rival bootleggers. He also read a paragraph from a New York paper telling how a certain temperance organization is working to have the present stringent law modified to save the young people. He stated "I sincerely believe we are working for the good of the province and in the interests of temperance." As his time was up he appealed to the people stating

ing that if elected they would do all possible in their interest. He was loudly applauded.

Mr. W. M. Lea then arose and was greeted by a small hand. He declared it to be an outrage to bring on an election at such a busy time of the year. He dealt with the road policy of the two previous governments, taking as example the roads built through the fourth district by the two parties. He contrasted the economical policy of the Bell government with the expenditure under Premier Stewart. In answer to the statement made by Mr. Howatt that the Liberals were holding political meetings on Sunday he said the ministers spoke on temperance because of their morals and because he asked to do so by members of their congregations. He said Premier Stewart would not refer the question in the form of a plebiscite because he wants to use it as a means of getting into power. He then read statements showing that prominent men in U.S.A. are in favour of temperance for since time of temperance came in force there has been a great improvement in almost every department of the country. He made his appeal to the electors on the unfairness of the thing. "for," he said "Premier Stewart is just trying to slide into power under cover of this clause which he calls temperance."

Joint Political Meeting In Borden Hall

The Conservative candidates Messrs Norman Lowther and Louis Howatt were enthusiastically received at the joint political meeting held at Borden June 9th. The reception of the Liberal candidates, Messrs. Horace Wright and Walter M. Lea was cool in comparison to that of their opponents.

The meeting was quite late in getting started and the audience was somewhat smaller than might have been expected. Mr. T. B. Gillespie was appointed chairman and performed his duties in a very efficient manner. Good order prevailed throughout the meeting with the usual interruptions by members of the audience, especially during the speeches of Messrs Wright and Lea.

Mr. N. Lowther, the first speaker reviewed and compared the work done by the last two governments. He spoke of the election promises of Hon. Premier Stewart and showed how all these promises have been fulfilled to the letter by his government. He mentioned that charges have been made against the last government but no concrete instances have as yet been brought forward. He next dealt with the finances under the Stewart regime and showed the improved financial conditions under Conservative administration. He then dealt at some length on the platform of the Conservative party and contrasted certain planks with those of the Liberal party.

Coming to the temperance question the speaker declared the present act was passed merely as a war-time measure in all the Canadian provinces, and showed that

THE REVISED RATE FOLLOWING IS EFFECTIVE FROM DATE OF LAST METER READING AND WILL APPLY TO BILLS FOR MONTH OF JUNE, 1927.

POWER RATE

Applicable to consumers who can be served from suitable existing lines. No bill rendered on this rate of less than \$3.00 per month.

Service Charges:
On all connected load a Service Charge of 50 cents per month per Horse Power, will be made for the first 10 H. P. of connected load. When connected load exceeds 10 Horse Power that part of such load in excess of 10 Horse Power, will carry no Service Charge.

Energy Charge—(In addition to Service Charge.)
For the 1st 200 k. w. h. per month at 7c per k. w. h.
For the next 200 k. w. h. per month at 5c per k. w. h.
For the next 500 k. w. h. per month at 4c per k. w. h.
Excess of 1000 k. w. h. per month at 3c per k. w. h.
Discount—None.
Minimum Charge—(Effective for connected loads in excess of 10 h. p.)

In case the bill for any month computed on the service charge plus the energy rate is less than 50 cents per Horse Power of all connected load, then a Minimum Bill computed at 50 cents per Horse Power on all connected load, will be rendered.

Waiving of Minimum Charge:—
The Minimum Charge will be waived for any three, consecutive months in a year, upon the Company receiving written notice from the Consumer requesting that Minimum Charge be waived for three specified consecutive months.

Note—In case a Consumer desires service for intermittent use of small motors and such service would result in a monthly bill of less than \$3.00 computed at power rate, then such consumer may elect to be billed on the Lighting Rate, carrying a Service Charge of 50 cents per Horse Power of connected load.
