ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

The Minto left Georgetown at the usual time yesterday but did not reach Pictou last night.

GAUVIN, Gentzel and Co. have added another dressing room to their already commodious photographic parlors.

The Stanley's last cargo from Georgetown included 24 passengers and 2018 packages way freight totalling 128000 lbs.

There will be a basket social in the League of The Cross Hall on Tuesday the 23th. Proceeds in aid of Notre Dame Convent.

About seventy came to the city by the special yesterday afternoon to attend the hockey. The special returned about midnight.

JOHN Dennis, father of Wm. Dennis of the Halifax Herald and grandfather of Mrs. A. W. Robb of this city died in Halifax Wednesday, aged 70 years.

The Guardian learns that the names of Thos Campbell and Henry Lowe are mentioned for candidates, as Commissioners of Sewer and Water Works.

Dr. Samuel A. Nicholson and Miss Minnie J. Cantelo, both formerly of Dundas, P. E. I., were united in marriage at Boston Jan. 12 by Rev. S. C. Gunn, D. D.

The mails arrived in the city yesterday afternoon at four o'clock. The boats crossed each way at the Capes without difficulty. Another mail arrived at half past nine via Georgetown.

The market yesterday was largely attended notwithstanding the cold weather. Pork was quoted at 5 1/2 to 5 3/4 and the Dominion Packing Co. was giving five cents as the highest for live.

On account of the great difficulty experienced in getting the hose reels to the fire on Thursday night the hose was transferred to the old reels on the firemen's return to the City Building.

The Stanley arrived at Georgetown yesterday at half past four with 50 passengers, 130 bags of mails, and 407 pigs way freight, weighing 65,017 lbs. A special train went from Mount Stewart and reached the city on return at a quarter to ten.

The Stanley made ten round trips and one single trip on the Summerside-Tormentine route this winter and did not miss a trip. The Guardian inadvertently credited the route with only nine round trips, which nearly raised a panic in The Pioneer office.

A SUMMONS for third violation of the Prohibitory Law was issued some time ago against Angus McDonald, the prospective candidate in the council for Ward Two. Since that time however, Mr. McDonald has carefully avoided the officers and up to the present no trace of him has been found.

"RESOLVED that man is a creature of circumstances rather than the architect of his own fortune" was the subject of the debate in the Epworth League of the First Methodist Church last evening. The opener W. T. Wellner in a racy speech took the affirmative and supported his argument by incidents and observations from life as he found it. He was followed by Mr. Wilson who took the ground that man could to a large extent rise superior to adverse circumstances and become the architect of his own fortune. He quoted Lincoln, Napoleon and other eminent men, who in spite of very adverse circumstances arose to foremost places in the world. A number of speakers on both sides followed and the evening was very pleasantly and profitably spent. Upon a division being taken it was decided by a large majority that man is an architect of his own fortune.

Six Government boats and one opposition boat crossed at the Capes from Tormentine yesterday. There were four passengers on the Government boats and six lumbermen on the opposition ones. There were also 86 bags of mail. The ice was heavy on the mainland side but several leads were struck off the Island shore.

AN experienced traveller who has crossed at the Capes and also between Georgetown and Pictou many times, in conversation with The Guardian reports that he never saw such heavy ice at either places at this time of the winter. The continued cold weather has had its effect and the result will probably be much difficult navigation during the remainder of the winter.

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
