**Missionary Meeting**

Plans of Mount Allison University looking to extension work of various kinds, the consideration of the centenary celebration programme of the missionary society, provision for the re-organization of certain churches in co-operation with the Presbyterians and the hearing of further delegations and reports were the matters which occupied the delegates at the Methodist conference during Friday's sessions.

A public meeting was held in the evening under missionary auspices.

Mrs. C. E. Sanford, of St. John's, reviewed the history of the Women's Missionary Society emphasizing the contribution made by the women of the Church in the achievements of the century. A former delegate from Prince Edward Island, Thomas Moyle, made an impressive appeal for adequate support of the Church's missionary plans and the concluding address was by Dr. Arnup. The missionary centenary was given a good start.

The report of the standing missionary committee had first place on the agenda Friday afternoon. It was presented by Rev. George M. Young. Among the sections of Mr. Young's report to receive conference endorsement were recommendations that the offer of the Presbyterian Church to build and maintain a church in East St. John as a co-operative cause with the Methodists to meet and committee in the desert lands of Kat. It was carried out of joint programme.

The question of organizing co-operative work with the Presbyterian Church on Springfield-Newton and York, P. E. I. charges were referred to standing missionary committee with power to act.

The recommendation that a new mission be formed to include Napanogan and adjacent joints was not endorsed by conference. This matter was referred also to the missionary committee with a view to discovering whether a co-operative cause could not be organized with respect to the Methodist cause at Boiestown.

The financial statement of the committee showed that \$24,293 had been raised by the conference for missions this year. St. John district being one of those reporting an increase in preceding year, the amount being \$85.

Mr. Young explained the details in connection with the programme for the Canada-wide celebration this year of the centenary of the Missionary Society.

In any way other than in accord with the recommendations of the commission.

"I do not make the occasion opportune to make yelled attacks on the present system, or on the Civil Service Commission when debate is cut off on the orders of the day," said Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen.

"If the government wished to change the schedule there was way that it could be done. If I wished to make any alterations in the powers of the commission this could also be done. If, though, the government feels that the scale recommended is fair and right—and their approval would seem to indicate that—their government should not disavow its responsibility in the event of improper interference with that responsibility. I am prepared to back the government."

Mr. King immediately said that he had no intention of making a veiled attack on the Civil Service Commission. He thought that the House and the country should know what the situation was.

W. F. MacLean (Conservative, York South) asked what parliament could do in the matter, and Mr. King replied that he would be pleased to receive suggestions.

There are 51 mission charges on which co-operation is possible in the Maritime provinces. Rev. Dr. McConnell told the conference in following Mr. Young with his own annual report as superintendent of Maritime Methodist missions.

Speaking of the stipend paid the Methodist charges, he pointed out that only 3 of them were paying more than \$100 a year. The three charges in the Maritime Province were paying more than \$2,300 salary a year of them in the N. B. and P. E. I. conference—Centenary, in St. John; Central, in Moncton, and First Church, Charlottetown.

**Report of Social Work**

W. E. Millson, Associate Secretary of the General Evangelism and Social Service Department, addressed the conference on his work, urging the continuance of the Methodist Church as a mighty evangelistic agency. Last spring some 5,000 letters from Methodists, Presbyterians, Baptists and Anglicans praying the Ontario government to enforce the present temperance law rather than hold a referendum, had his effort. The O. T. A. was being better enforced than ever before and was a great success. But complete Dominion-wide prohibition was needed and Methodists wanted nothing to do with any public revenue from liquor. Government sale was no benefit. While investigating under direction of a newspaper man, at 3.15 one morning in a place in Montreal he had seen 12 men at 67 women completely drunk. A. B. MacDonald's articles were true. B. W. had a vast amount of bootlegging. Gambling was becoming a national crime, not only on the race-tracks, but illegally in most every town. The churches should demand that licensed gambling be done away with, and the law enforced against the other kind. Only clean men should be elected to parliament.

by the trade winds, the murky barrier trails off toward Kat. The particles held within the folds fall like rain and painting the landscape near at hand with a lavender gleam, in the distance with a covering that appears almost like banks of snow. Beneath this canopy of cloud the sun is blotted out and the countryside is darkened as by an approaching thunderstorm. In the desert lands of Kat are taking on a new appearance as is the floor of Kiluaea proper. The plantation of Pahala, some 25 miles from the volcano, likewise suffers. Ash one-sixteenth of an inch thick has spread over the buildings, fields and streets of the community.

Before the present disturbance began the pit was a rough ellipse measuring 2,000 by 1,800 feet. Today the void is estimated by Roy Finch in charge of the volcano observatory to be approximately 2,500 by 4,000 feet.

The Hawaiian National Park, in which Kiluaea is situated, is considered a dangerous area. Visitors are welcomed at the Volcano House, but they have been very carefully guided, especially since the death of T. A. Taylor and the disappearance of two soldiers who had been visiting at the Kiluaea military camp.

Motorists are warned that if they "insist on taking a chance" in approaching within three miles of the volcano, they should keep the road open and be ready for instant flight.
