**New Export Regulation**

(Canadian Press)  
**MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 12**—There is apparently a market in New Zealand for Canadian made oars. New Zealand, states the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways, possesses an extensive coast line and a relatively mild climate so boating in all its forms is most popular throughout the sheltered harbors, particularly in the North Island. There is a steady demand for boat oars to equip new craft or to replace the usual wear and tear of active boating seasons. The most popular oar is made of American ash, which heretofore were imported from the United States until exchange and currency conversion difficulties rendered prices unattractive. Since then importers have turned to Australia but the product received from that country is not altogether satisfactory. The type of ash oar most popular is a flat blade oar with round shank and chiefly for 7-ft. and 8-ft. oars. They are not usually leathered but are imported plain.

**Kelly And Wife Sentenced To A Life Term**

**OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 12**—(A.P.)—Prison "for the rest of your lives" was the government's firm answer today to the arrogant George Kelly and Kathryn, his wife, last of the Urschel kidnapping principles to be branded guilty. Convicted at the conclusion of a swift, three-day trial, the machine-gun hoodlum and his modish, 30-year-old wife with surly men heard Federal Judge Rogar S. Vaughn pronounce the maximum sentence possible under the "Lindbergh law." in the white. **PROGRESS IN SPECULATE ON CANCER CURES POST OF HIGH IS REPORTED COMMISSIONER**

**CHICAGO, Oct. 12**—(A.P.)—Surgeons from the United States and Canada yesterday reported 12,746 cases of cancer have been cured in the last three years. Thirty-one specialists reported this progress in a symposium entitled "Cancer is Curable" sponsored by the American College of Surgeons. The figures show, said Dr. Franklin K. Martin of Chicago, that the American death rate from cancer can be cut one-third—from 150,000 to 100,000 a year—by periodic examinations and early treatment. "The statement that cancer is curable," said Dr. Beckwith Whitehouse of the British Radium Commission is the great contribution the profession can make to the public." The symposium was particularly timely, said Dr. Charles A. Dukes of Oakland, Cal., because cancer's mortality rate has risen steadily until it is now second cause of death in the United States. Heart ailments rank first. Some of the surgeons and their reports: Dr. Whitehouse said "the British figures show that cancer of the cervix uteri can be cured in 50 per cent of the cases." Dr. Chevalier Jackson of Philadelphia said "about 80 per cent of cancer of the larynx can be cured, and by a relatively simple operation." Surgery X-ray and radium irradiation were the weapons used, and all of them, the surgeons agreed, could be utilized to more advantage if patients would report for treatment before the disease is too far advanced. Because cancer has a painless start, it was explained, relatively few apply for treatment while the odds are still in their favor. Five years of freedom from the disease, after treatment, was considered a cure for the purposes of the symposium.

**Canadian Strobe From Errand-Boy To Finance King**

**WOODSTOCK, Ont., Oct. 12**—(C.P.)—Left fatherless at two and a half years of age, taken from school at 11 to work as errand boy in a grocery store—and, in 1932, as a merchant prince, summoned by the President of the United States to help organize a recovery programme for the nation—that brief outline helps to picture the remarkable career of John Gillespie Bullock, native of Paris, Ont., who died Sept. 15 in Los Angeles, says The Sentinel Review. Mr. Bullock, president of Bullock's, Inc., died of a heart ailment at the age of 62. The Los Angeles Examiner brings many interesting particulars of his life. "His career," The Examiner goes on, "was as inspiring as it was brilliant. He began in business as a \$2-a-week errand boy. When the end came he was the millionaire owner of the Bullock department store enterprises, including two of the largest and most beautiful mercantile institutions in the country. "Among his many contributions to the progress of Southern California was the work as chairman of the bond committee of the board of directors of the Metropolitan Water District. He was credited with having negotiated, almost single-handedly, the government's \$40,000,000 loan for the Colorado River aqueduct project. Two 10 storey buildings, one eight-storey structure and an imposing height-limit addition now under construction form physical evidence of the development of his business, as does the impressive Bullock's Wilshire store and the Westwood store. How keenly Mr. Bullock's death was felt was demonstrated when both the city council and the board of directors of the Metropolitan Water District adjourned in respect to his memory. "John G. Bullock was born in 1871 in Paris, Ont. His father, a railroad worker, died when his son was only two and one half years old. At 11 the boy went to work as errand boy in a grocery store. But it was the dry goods business that attracted him, and eventually he became a clerk in the store of Henry R. Reder, Paris. "Meanwhile, two of his uncles, Matthew and Robert Gillespie, had come to California in search of gold. Their letters to the little Ontario town fired the youth's imagination. So, in 1896, convinced that the Golden State was the land of opportunity, he came to Los Angeles. For nearly three months he tramped the streets looking for work. Finally he was hired at \$12 a week by Arthur Letts, later to become a business leader and the sponsor of Mr. Bullock's own remarkable career. "In 1906, when there was visible evidence of the strides Los Angeles was to make, Mr. Letts gave him the great opportunity. He decided to found the store at Seventh and Broadway. He put John Bullock's name over it, to indicate his complete confidence in his young assistant. After Mr. Letts' death the man who had started at \$12 a week became the owner of the gigantic

**BELIEVES RECOVERY HAS SET IN**

**Floyd S. Chalmers Addresses Members of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.**

**OTTAWA, Oct. 12**—Peace, migration of men and money, reduction of taxation and governmental costs, and solution of Canada's railway problem tonight were held essential to the Dominion's prosperity in an address of Floyd S. Chalmers, editor of the Financial Post, before the annual meeting of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Chalmers, who held a growing conviction existed, based on very definite evidence, that world recovery has set in declared Canada had never made money out of war.  
 War Talk  
 "The propaganda from Europe preaching to us that war is inevitable is increasing," he said. "From past experience we should know that war talk is being assiduously propagated by those who make money out of war. In the long run Canada's prosperity depends on peace and only peace. Canada has never started a war, nor has any war ever been started because of Canada. We have never made a profit out of anyone else's war, nor out of those in which we have participated."  
 Restoration of an international monetary standard, he continued, should effectively restore world institution.  
 "Indicative of Mr. Bullock's methods are these sentences in which he often expressed the ideals on which the great firm of Bullock's was founded: 'The ideals of this business must not be sacrificed to gain.' 'Concentration of purpose will accomplish anything.' 'Every customer must be satisfied.'"

**Condensed Milk A Delicacy In British Malaya**

**MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 12**—British Malaya sweetened condensed milk is looked upon as a great delicacy by the natives and Chinese and they like drinking it from the can. In good times considerable quantities are consumed in this way, states the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. During 1931 the Netherlands supplied the greatest quantity of preserved milk, 38.23 per cent out of a total of 910,717 cases. Switzerland supplied 18.1 per cent. Australia 14.67 per cent. Canada supplied 9,100 cases.

**Maintains Record As World's Wool Centre**

**MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 12**—For the eighth consecutive season over one million bales of wool have been sold in the Sydney, Australia, market, states the Canadian National Steamships Ltd., which maintains steamer connect on between Canada and this part of the Empire in the Antipodes. This market upheld its reputation as the principal wool selling centre of the world for the season 1932-33 which closed on June 30th, handling the record total of 1,332,000 bales, valued at \$71,914,200. A fairly substantial increase in wool prices took place during the closing months of the season.
