NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—The great man of baseball, George Herman Ruth, passed his 40th milestone today as magnificently as he has done all else in his fantastic career—host to a huge army of guests even though they were only influenza germs.

With a cough and a wheeze and a low monotone of groans, the Babe languished weakly but brilliantly in a robe of scarlet and salmon, received stacks of telegrams and letters, had his picture taken countless times, and met the press—all the time expanding upon the symptoms and diseases that inhabited his huge frame.

He leaves tomorrow for St. Petersburg, Fla., to rest before starting training for what probably is his final year as a regular outfielder with the Yankees. He lost 16 pounds in a 10-day tussle with the flu, and though he has most of it back, he looks washed out.

"I'm getting old, I'm getting old," he said, and for the first time it seemed as though he really meant it. "For three days," he explained, "I had a temperature of 104 1/2 degrees. Hell, I was unconscious for two days; 20 hours anyway."
