AN ORIGINAL DOCUMENT.—Mr. James T. Purdie, of this city has in his possession an original document in manuscript, signed by Joseph Bouchette, Deputy Surveyor General of Canada, and dated August, 1791, pointing out important inaccuracies in the boundary line between Upper and Lower Canada. A hand-drawn map illustrating the situation accompanies the text. The document is one which should be preserved in the Public Archives and no doubt Mr. Purdie would consent to its being so disposed of.

LOOK INTO OYSTER SITUATION.—There are at present on the Island two scientific experts looking into the oyster situation in this Province. They were in Summerside yesterday and were met by Mr. A. E. McLean, M.P., who, in company with Superintendent Gallant and officers Squarbrigs and Palmer proceeded to Grand River and Richmond Bay to look over the oyster grounds. These gentlemen are looking into the oyster situation from the health standpoint, on account of the typhoid outbreak from American oysters a year ago to prove to the pub-

lic without question that the Canadian oysters are free from any affection that might be prejudicial to the health of lovers of the delicious bivalve.

CANADA HAS 56,063 RADIOS OTTAWA, July 29.—The number of radio receiving licenses held in Canada at the end of last month totalled 56,063, it was learned at the radio branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries today.

Ontario led all the provinces with a total of 28,507; Quebec occupied second place, 7,882 licenses having been issued to residents of that province; Saskatchewan was third, 6,551 licenses being held by residents there. Licenses issued to citizens of other provinces show the following figures: Manitoba, 4,443; British Columbia, 3,392; Alberta, 3,004; charge to do.

Nova Scotia, 1,435; New Brunswick, 735; Prince Edward Island, 87; Yukon, 22, and Northwest Territories, 54.

Military Rule In Portugal Ended

LISBON, July 29.—Military rule in Portugal terminated yesterday. Domingos Persia, president of the Chamber of Deputies, arrived in Lisbon yesterday from Paris personally to confer with President Gomez before accepting the invitation of the President for him to form a cabinet to replace that of Antonio Da Silva, which resigned last week.
