It is surprising the large number of people in this city who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian or subscription, ask Central for the News Phone No. 133, or for the Advertising Phone No. 132-3, instead of 132-2; or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription Phone No. 132-2, or for the News Phone No. 133, instead of 132-3; or when they want the News or Editorial department ask Central for the Subscription Phone No. 132-2, or the Advertising Phone No. 132-3, instead of 133, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one of the above departments to find out what number to ask for to get another department. All this is a waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions of news, nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, upstairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 7 P.M. daily it is useless to ask for any phone number except 188. Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want will greatly lessen the work of the patient Central telephone and Guardian clerks and thus help make their lives much brighter. 3-16dt.

HAULTAIN WANTS NEW LIST MADE

REGINA, Sask., March 13 - A curious situation exists in the Saskatchewan Legislature. At midnight Saturday a 51-hour deadlock ended, to be renewed today. Each side is firmly resolved not to surrender. No business can be transacted, and it looks as if dissolution is inevitable. The trouble developed to an acute stage on Thursday, when the Opposition announced that no business would be transacted until the Government had given assurances that the new lists would be prepared before another election would be held. This Premier Scott refused to do. The Opposition claims that there are no proper voters' lists in existence in the Province. The Government today declared that one of two things would be done at once unless the Opposition receded. The House would be dissolved or the rules amended so as to prevent the Opposition blocking supplies. Mr. Haultain, leader of the Provincial Conservatives, has refused to yield.

WASHINGTON, March 16 - When Congress assembles in regular session next December, it is believed that the president may be able to redeem his promise to submit a treaty with Great Britain, providing for the general and unlimited arbitration of all questions arising between Great Britain and the United States, attention having been directed to this subject by a remarkable speech of Sir Edward Gray in parliament. It is learned that negotiations for such have been proceeding informally for a long time, though neither side has yet submitted a final concerted proposition.

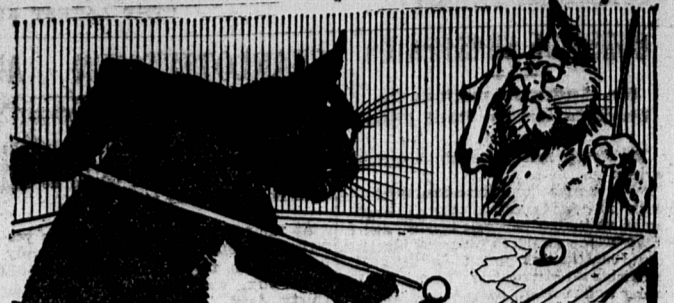
OBITUARY.

A father in Israel has been removed in the person of James Gillespie, Elder, of Carleton, Lot 28, who passed calmly and peacefully into his eternal rest on Friday morning, March 10th, 1911, in the 72nd year of his age, crowned with respectability and honor. He was the eldest son of the late William Gillespie, Elder, Carleton Point. He was fully assured that his soul would immediately pass into glory and his body be still united to Christ would rest in the grave till the resurrection, at the last day, when the glorified twin will unite in the chorus: "Alle luide! Amen! Lo! the Lamb is victorious." The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Daniel McLean, who gave an eloquent and effective discourse, taking for his text Rev. 5:9.
