ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

ABEGWEITS vs Victorias, Friday.

CHILDREN'S service, St. Peter's Cathedral, 5 p. m. today.

THURSDAY, March 10 the pianoforte sale and tea will be held in First Methodist Church.

The Minto and the Stanley both made good crossings yesterday. A special from Georgetown arrived at 2:10 and returned last night at 8:45.

There will be a congregational meeting held in the schoolroom of St. Peter's Cathedral this evening at 8:15, to consider the matter of building a rectory.

An effort is being made to have the American steamers and the City of London use Peake's Wharf, No. 1, foot of Queen Street, the ensuing season.

The Supreme Court opened in Georgetown yesterday Chief Justice Sullivan presiding. There were no criminal cases. Several civil cases were disposed of and the jury cases came up to day.

A FEW nights ago the Eureka of Halifax colored hockey team defeated the Halifax team thus winning the color championship. Two of the Mills Brothers of Charlottetown played on the Eureka.

Hon. James Richards is in the city and has had a consultation with Mr. Armstrong impressing the views of the people of Prince County in favor of a special train for mails from Sackville to Cape Tormentine.

The lecture of T. C. James in the Y. M. L. A. course in St. James Hall last evening dealt with the great Indian Mutiny of 1857. It was a graphic and eloquent portrayal of the appalling dangers, the cruel massacres, the brave rescue, the heroism, devotion and courage which marked that great crisis in our Empire's history. The large audience listened with closest attention throughout, and signified their approval of the lecture in an unmistakable way. It was admirably illustrated with scenes and portraits of persons prominently connected with the struggle. W. S. Stewart, K. C. in moving the vote of thanks spoke in highly appreciative words of the lecture. The motion was seconded by J. E. B. McCready. The National Anthem was then sung.

The Carnival held in Hillsboro Bank last night was quite successful both in the attendance of skaters and spectators. The costumes were on the whole an improvement on those of the first carnival. The ladies' prize for best costume was won by Miss Hilda Stewart, Brighton, who represented the Character of Pocahontas. J. A. S. Bayler in the representation of the Turk carried off honors among the gentlemen. Special mention should be made of the characters represented by Miss Winnie Ryan, Miss Ruby Hattray, Miss Hazel Hunter, and Miss Newton, and it was a matter of difficulty for the judges, Messrs. Chase, Leigh and A. G. Poole, to reach a decision. The 11th Regt. Band rendered a select program of music.

As a result of the conference at Moncton between Superintendent Sharp, Comptroller Armstrong and General Traffic Manager Tillin, The Guardian learns that an arrangement has been arrived at for the payment of the outstanding claims of the railway for transmission of the mails last winter and also for the railway mail service in the future. It is understood that in future the postal department will pay the railway \$76 a mile instead of \$50 a mile per year as in the past for the general yearly transmission of mails. This will mean a total of \$16188 as there are 213 miles of Island railroad instead of \$10,650. It has also been arranged that special trains will be paid for by the postal department at the rate of 50 cents per train mile instead of \$1 per train mile as in the past.

One night last week the C. P. R. train was too late in reaching Truro to allow passengers for eastern points to come through on the regular train therefrom. This is not an unusual occurrence, but it is worthy of note that on the special train which was made up to accommodate eastern passengers on the night in question there were only six passengers. Two of these were young women who had been intimate friends in Boston and left that city on the same train, unexpectedly, to attend the funeral of a brother who had been killed. The third passenger was a young man returning from Boston to attend the funeral of his mother on P. E. Island; the fourth a mother who had been to Boston attending the funeral of a daughter; while the remaining two were mother and son returning from New York, as a result of the illness of the latter.—Picton Advocate.

The final games in the Hockey League Series will be played on Friday night between the Abbies and the Victorias. The latter will make a determined effort to win at least one game this season, and a hard battle will result. The greatest interest however will centre in the intermediate games. Friday's game will most likely determine the trophy winner. The Vics have three games to their credit and the Abbies two. Should the latter win, the intermediates would play off at a later date.

CHARLOTTETOWN FARMERS' MARKET

The market during the past week has not been plentifully supplied, and prices are unchanged. Dressing hogs are not offering in large lots, and prices are low for best, but the tendency is rather to drop a fraction lower than to become higher. Live hogs (best bacon) at the Dominion Packing Company yards are bringing 42 cents for good stock, and lower figures for inferior grades. There are very little offerings, and 30 cts per bushel for Black and White is the buyer's figure. Loose hay is worth from 55 to 65 cts per 100 lbs; and baled hay \$10.50 to \$11.50 per ton according to quality. Fowl and chickens keep about 7 1/2 cts. per lb. The quality offering at this season of the year is not such an attraction to the exporter as could be made by a little more care and attention in fattening and preparing for market. This would enhance their value and be an all around benefit to seller, buyer and exporter. Potatoes are bringing 25 to 30 cts per bushel with only enough coming in to barely supply the local demand. Eggs will certainly soon come down from their high price as the weather becomes warmer. They are at present 23 to 24 cts per dozen, and butter 23 to 24 cts per lb. No eggs are being brought for export trade.

FEAR THAT CHINA TAKE A HAND

Disturbance on the Frontier is Expected.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 19, 1904
Despite the fact that Secretary Hay has apparently done all within the power of any government to restrain the Chinese from taking part in the Russian-Japanese war, there is a growing fear in diplomatic circles here that China may eventually take a hand in the war in spite of the government's proclamation of neutrality. Already Chinese troops have been sent north along the Manchurian frontier for the ostensible purpose of maintaining the precepts of the neutrality proclamation, but in the event of Japanese success on land, as well as on water, there is believed to be grave danger of an uprising against the foreigners all over China, as well as a general movement against the Russians.

The United States is prepared for just such an emergency and the Asiatic fleet is being kept near to the base of possible trouble. Already the cruiser squadron, consisting of the New Orleans, Albany, Cincinnati, Helena and Raleigh, are either on their way to or in the vicinity of Shanghai and Seoul. It is stated on the best of authority that this government will keep all its heavy battleships, including the Kentucky, Oregon and Wisconsin and the monitors Monterey and Modoc, together with its gun boat fleet, close to the naval base at Cavite ready for any emergency.

In San Francisco harbor there are being held six fully equipped transports, capable of carrying more than 6000 men and supplies to China at a moment's notice. These transports were originally fitted out for service in Panama, but since the war scare with Colombia has passed away the work of preparing them for service has not been relinquished.

In addition to the above named vessels there are available upon call the ships of the Pacific squadron, including the flag ship New York, the cruisers Boston and Marblehead and gunboats Bennington, Boston, Concord and Petrel.

The action of the navy department in holding its ships ready is regarded here as significant and tends to bear out the feeling in diplomatic circles that trouble in China is only a question of time.
