FARMERS CAUGHT GOLD RUSH FEVER

FRANKLIN, N. H., Sept. 16.—Farmers in this vicinity have deserted their fields and equipped themselves with pickaxes, shovels, crow bars, dynamite and optimism in search for gold. At the railroad station, here, strange machinery is arriving by freight, including a digging machine of a type distinctly alien to these parts and certainly not designed for the potato trade or other farming purposes.

The cause of all this excitement was the "find" of Curtis Tilton, a farmer. He has started to tear a portion of his land to pieces. The cause of this is a letter he has received from the assay office in Washington in which occurs the statement, "\$9 worth of gold and \$2 worth of silver per 1,000 of ore."

Experts say this percentage is decidedly high and predict that this area may prove a second Klondike. For many years it has been known that gold and silver existed in the ledges in certain sections of this state and from time to time a gold fever has appeared and disappeared.

For years the hill on which gold has been discovered has been known as "Klondike Mountain." Tilton has dreamed for the past twenty years that gold was found under his barn in his pasture, at the bottom of his well in fact everywhere about his little farm. So persistent became his dreams that friends urged him to have some of his land analyzed. He took some ore from the hillside and had it examined. The yield was anywhere from \$2 to \$15 worth of gold per ton or ore. In one case the figure was \$19 in one ton.

Today Tilton anxiously awaits the result of investigations being made to determine whether the gold-bearing rock exists in sufficient quantities to make mining profitable.

which was officially Scotch from the beginning. It was granted to be bestowed to us from our Kingdom of Scotland as a part thereof; and after the lapse of three centuries the Province still retains many distinctively Scottish characteristics. It is the only province of present-day Canada that has a flag of its own and that flag proudly proclaims the Scottish traditions of the province. The emblem is a blue St. Andrew's cross, with the Scottish lion rampant in gold. It was the assumption of the King James I granted to Sir William Alexander as hereditary Lieutenant-General a charter for the whole peninsula which was renamed in the patent Nova Scotia, instead of the old name Acadia given to it by the French. But it was necessary to make the Scotch occupation of the colony effective, and to do so by the strong right arm of the settlers. Accordingly King James offered a baronetcy to every one who would furnish "one thousand marks Scottish money" and six men, "armed, apparelled, and victualled for two yeares" for the purpose of laying firmly the foundations of the new colony. The spirit of adventure was evidently strong in the Scottish people of those days. The King's offer appealed to patriots as well as to soldiers of fortune, and those who assisted with men and money to wards the founding of the colony must have been a goodly company, for as many as 87 of the Nova Scotia baronetcies survive to our time. One of the best known of present-day holders is Sir Herbert Maxwell, the Scottish naturalist and archaeologist. The original Scottish settlement in Nova Scotia, however, was des-

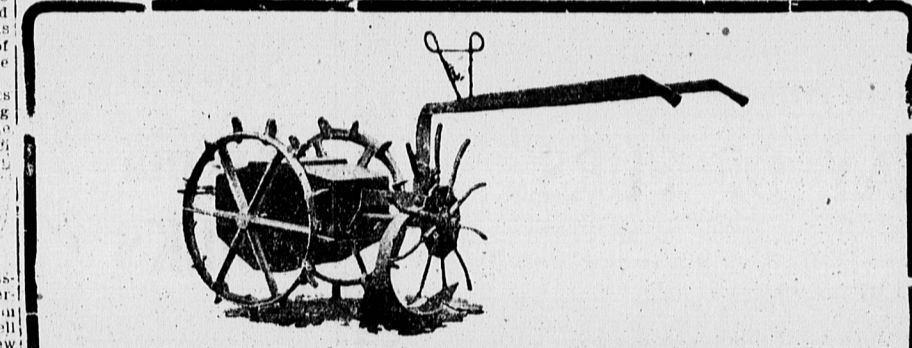
