HOWARD WEEKS, Fredericton, came to the city yesterday to undergo an operation at the P. E. L. Hospital for appendicitis.

At Police Court yesterday the adjourned case against Fred MacDonald was dismissed, several witnesses not having been served. H. J. Palmer acted for Inspector Jenkins in his absence.

The Stanley made the round trip from Georgetown yesterday having been called back by the accident to the Minto. Her outward cargo included 450 cases condensed milk, 600 bundles hides, 75 dressed hogs, 31 bbls pork, 20 bbls apples and a small quantity of sundries.

The Stanley left Picton yesterday morning at once when telegraphed for to come to the relief of the Minto. She had only partially unloaded but had sufficient space last night to take all of the freight in Georgetown.

The outward cargo of the Stanley yesterday morning comprised 450 cases condensed milk, 600 bbls hides, 100 dressed hogs, 30 bbls pork and a quantity of meats and sundries, five cars in all. This cleared all outward freight up to yesterday.

At a special meeting of St. Paul's Church congregation held last evening in the schoolroom, the report of the Sunday School building committee was received and adopted. Among other things the report advised the acceptance of H. & S. Lowe's tender for the erection of a new building according to plans and specifications drawn by C. B. Chappell, Architect. MRS. CHADWICK TELLS HER DEBTS

CLEVELAND, March 25.—In bankruptcy court here, Mrs. Cassie S. Chadwick detailed some of her financial transactions in the course of an examination by Attorney Louis J. Grossman, acting for Trustee Nathan Looser. Mrs. Chadwick testified that the total indebtedness would not exceed \$750,000. Of this sum borrowed from various persons, she had received only \$517,000, leaving \$233,000 for commissions to the money lenders. She said she owed certain banks in Cleveland \$200,000. The names of three institutions she was willing to give Mr. Looser, trustee for the creditors, privately. The examination disclosed additional assets of \$200,000. Of this amount \$58,000 is due from Charles H. Stewart, of Cleveland, and \$150,000 worth of jewelry held by Wolfers Bros., of Brussels, Belgium. Mrs. Chadwick asserted that there are other assets, consisting of jewelry and valuable articles, held by other persons for her.
