WOULD PAY THE SYDNEY, C. B. IS DEPOSITORS 25 HARD HIT BY CTS. ON DOLLAR RECENT STORM

(Canadian Press)

TORONTO, Oct. 5.—Three recommendations regarding the affairs of the Home Bank are, it is understood, being discussed by the Federal Cabinet today, according to the Toronto Star. These recommendations, it is stated, have been made by expert bankers associated with Curator A. B. Barker, and other advisors.

The first is, that Canadian banks pay depositors in the Home Bank, 25 per cent of their deposits. This, it is suggested, could be done at an early date.

The second recommendation is, that the assets of the banks should be prevented from going into liquidation.

The third proposal is to form a company to take over the assets of the Home Bank and sell or operate them as circumstances warrant. The company to be formed will consist of the creditors of the Home Bank, the great majority of whom are depositors. It is thought that by this means the great expense of liquidation will be saved and the depositors obtain the greatest returns from the assets.

The curator's report is expected to make plain the connection of the Home Bank with the British Dominion holding and investment corporation, says the Star. The curator's report is also expected to reveal the connection of the Home Bank with a pulp company doing business in Australia. Also, the amount of money invested in timber limits and a pulp business in British Columbia. The connection of the Home Bank with a railway company in New Orleans will also be made clear.

A FOSSILIZED OYSTER CAUSES SPECULATION

WINNIPEG, Oct. 5.—Oysters on the half shell was apparently no unusual item on the stone age menu in Manitoba, whether our cave-man ancestors had a fondness for the succulent bivalve is not easily determined, but certain it is that they could without much trouble, gather a few dozen from the surface of a meal of roast dinosaur.

Plowing along the top of a hill at Pope, Manitoba, A. G. Shearer recently unearthed what is believed by scientists to be a relic of the pre-glacial age—a fossilized oyster.

"In all probability he struck a rock carried by the ice of the glacial age and belonging to a period millions of years earlier than the ice age," was the comment of Dr. R. C. Wallace, professor of geology at the University of Manitoba. Dr. Wallace stated that the limestone and clays of this province were full of fossils of million of years ago. At one time he said, this whole country was the bed of an ocean. There is no river or lake near Pope now.

FASHIONABLE FOOTWEAR

SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 5.—The tropical storm which raged over Cape Breton for thirty-one hours, from eleven o'clock Sunday night till six o'clock Tuesday morning, released a torrent of rainfall totaling more than four and a half inches. As a result Sydney is cut off from railway and telephone communication with the outside world, while the telegraph services are working under difficulties.

The principal damage tabulated is as follows:

The French steamer Yport, 503 tons, a total loss on Scatterie Island. Her crew are all safe.

The schooner Almada, with thirty thousand dollars worth of liquor was forced into port by loss of sails.

Canadian National Railways completely tied up by washouts at Little Bras d'Or and Braschois. Steamer Princess is bringing marooned train passengers from Grand Narrows to Sydney. There may be no train service for four days.

Cape Breton Electric Power House flooded for the first time in twenty years. Lights and power were off for two hours last night.

Forty to fifty houses flooded and people are marooned in stores.

Many street bridges washed out and two autos lost in fifteen feet of water in a deep subway. Washouts cut highway communication with North Sydney. hundred and twenty-five lines of the Maritime Telephone and Telegraph Company out of order, and long distance lines to Halifax and New Glasgow cut off.

Reports are pouring in of enormous damage to bridges and to roads throughout the country.

CONVICTED MAN DECLARED SANE

DEDHAM, Mass., Oct. 5.—Nicola Sacco, convicted murderer, is sane Superintendent Frank Carlyle, of the Bridgewater State Hospital for the Insane, reports to Judge Thayer of the Superior Court today. When the hearing on motions for a new trial for Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti started this afternoon Judge Thayer read a letter from Superintendent Carlyle to this effect. Judge Thayer ordered Sacco turned over to the sheriff and remanded to the Dedham Jail.

Sacco, who was arrested in Montreal, attracted much attention several months ago by going on a hunger strike in protest against being confined to jail. He fasted from Feb. 15 until March 17, when he took food voluntarily.

Sacco and Vanzetti were convicted in 1921 of the murder of a factory paymaster and his guard at South Braintree but were not sentenced. Judge Thayer presided at the trial, and it was he who committed Sacco to the State Hospital for the Insane at Bridgewater last April after Sacco had conducted his hunger strike in the Dedham Jail.

Vanzetti is serving a sentence in the state prison for a previous offense.

Demonstrations of protest against the conviction of the two men have been held in Europe and South America by persons who charged that the men were innocent victims of a drive against radicals.

ARCTIC COMING HOME SAFELY

OTTAWA, Oct. 5.—All anxiety over the fate of the old reliable Canadian Government steamer "Arctic," which left Quebec City on July 1st, this year, for another difficult voyage through the ice-strewn water between Greenland and Ellesmere Island, on the north east coast of Canada, has been allayed by the receipt today by O. S. Finnie, Director of the Northwest Territory for the Department of the Interior, of a cablegram from J. D. Craig, in charge of the expedition on the "Arctic," which is still under command of Captain Bernier.

Mr. Craig stated that the party expected to be in the Straits of Belle Isle tomorrow and to reach Quebec City about October 10th. Ice conditions in northern waters have been exceptionally difficult this summer, and it was this fact that caused anxiety for the Arctic expedition. It was feared that they might experience trouble similar to that which befell some of Stefansson's undertaking. The "Arctic" was so bad, according to Mr. Craig's message, that all attempts to reach Sabine, the northernmost goal of this year's expedition, had to be abandoned. It had been planned, in addition to try some Eskimo, to establish a police post at Sabine, which is on Ellesmere Island and opposite Etah in Greenland. The purpose of establishing a post at Sabine was to have a convenient place from which to check the incursions of Icelanders who have been crossing over to Ellesmere and running foul of the Eskimos in the former's efforts to bag musk oxen.

Two Eskimos were tried and convicted for various serious offenses during this trip in the north. One was sentenced to ten years in the Manitoba penitentiary and another to two years close confinement at Pond's Inlet.
