## THE BOER LONG TOMS

### Destroyed by the Fleeing Boers.

### MAJOR O. PELLETIER Will Command the Five Hun- dred Returning Cana- dians.

THE BOERS ARE FLEEING BEFORE "BOBS."  
LONDON, Sept. 20.—(Special).—Lord Roberts telegraphing from Nelspruit says: Boers have destroyed their long toms and fled and nothing is left of the Boer army but a few marauding bands. Many have fled to Portuguese territory. Kelly-Kenny is after a band located at Doornberg.

THE RETURNING CANADIANS.  
OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—The boys are coming!  
Five hundred have had enough of campaigning and have elected to take their discharge at the expiration of the year's service.

The Military Department has received a cablegram from Lt.-Col. Biggar, Deputy Assistant Adjutant General in South Africa. His message is dated at Cape Town, Sept. 18th, and states that five hundred of the first Canadian contingent will return to Canada immediately, the remainder having elected to stay in South Africa till the end of the war. This means about three hundred and fifty Canadian Major Oscar Pelletier will command the five hundred Canadians to return from South Africa.

The artillery and the mounted troops from Canada will continue in South Africa until December or January, by which time it is expected that the country will have been pacified. The Militia Department has made another great concession and now allows sleeping car fare for the returning South Africans, travelling from Quebec.

## A SCHOONER SEIZED.

Two Vessels Ashore at Sydney. One on the Beach Opposite the Hotel.  
SYDNEY, C. B., Sept. 20.—Capt. Gordon, of the tug Gladiator, seized the schooner Howard, Capt. Trahan, at North Sydney, yesterday, for smuggling liquors from St. Pierre.

The schooner Lizzie Catherine, Lord master, west ashore at Barrack's Point. The scho. Fauna, Capt. McDonald, dragged her anchor at the International Pier, and drifted up the harbor until opposite the Sydney Hotel, where she ran on the beach. She was floated yesterday without damage.

THE schooner Clara Jane, Clark, bound to Charlottetown, with a load of limestone for J. T. Pearson, was driven ashore Sunday at Boughton Island, outside the entrance to Georgetown harbor. The schooner is a complete wreck and the total loss will amount to \$700.

QUITE a sensation was caused early yesterday morning, when a member of the police force discovered what looked like the missile of an anarchist. Keeping at a safe distance his imagination pictured to him the surroundings. The bank which formed a background aided to confirm his suspicion. It was one of those "infernal machines" which had caused such devastation in other parts of the globe. As the seconds ebbed away the officer's duty loomed up before him and with his usual manly determination he concluded that as he had been a hero in life, the explosion of the bomb would confirm him a hero in death. Seconds rolled into minutes and he thought that his time of existence was nearing its end. At last with his usual calm decision he seized the machine and after due examination took it to the station where it was submitted to a more rigid examination and quarantined, only newspaper men being permitted to examine it, and they had to solemnly declare that in the case of an explosion their heirs were not to attribute death to the carelessness of the officer.

An explanation was given to the whole affair later on in the morning, when it was learned that Mr. John Gillis had been using a large cannon ball in connection with the moving of a safe and that some body had removed it from where Mr. Gillis had left it.

## CHINESE PUZZLE

### Foreign Office Announces That

### IT IS NOT EXPEDIENT To Join in Russia's Proposal for Evacuation of Pekin.

THE CHINESE PUZZLE.  
LONDON, Sept. 20.—(Special).—The foreign office announced that it has been found expedient not to join in Russia's proposal for evacuation of Peking as the Boers are ready to move on the city as soon as the troops will leave it. The allies attacked Pei Tang ports at day light. It is now believed that ten thousand allied troops will winter at Peking. The Dowager Empress wants to return if she is guaranteed protection. Advices just received report massacre of 27 missionaries at Tayuan on July 25.
