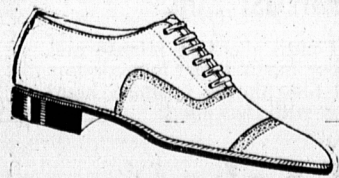

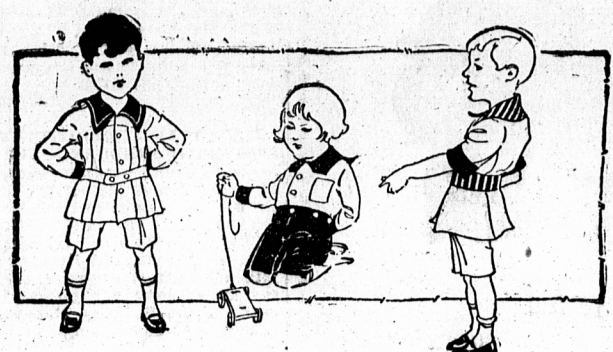
Address of welcome to Frederick Andrew, Sr., Freddie Andrew, Jr., Richard Hartz, Harold Clements.
