

**ROTARY**

The shooting season here last year was very satisfactory but the same could not be said about the trout season, says W. G. Gaudet, President of the Fish and Game Protective Association, in an address before the Charlottetown Rotary Club at their meeting in the "Charlottetown" at noon yesterday.

Spot fishing and commercial fishing were not so far apart as some might think, intimated the speaker who went on to say that sport fishing in this province must in future be looked upon from a commercial standpoint if the trout industry is to be developed properly.

Mr. Gaudet suggested that a number of fishing spots be devoted to trout resident anglers. Game licenses sold in New Brunswick in 1938 were valued at \$19,173. Contrasted with that was the case in this province last year when only forty licenses were sold to trout resident anglers. Game licenses sold in New Brunswick in 1938 were valued at \$80,574. It was pointed out as the speaker illustrated the extent to which the fish and game resources are developed in the sister province.

The trout season here last year was particularly bad and this was due partly to the dry season, Mr. Gaudet explained that the lack of our water was responsible for an ever decreasing amount of trout. This was detrimental not only to anglers and sport fishers, but also to aquaculture, he believed.

The decline of the miller industry and the fact that the miller owners had substituted machine power for water power, had resulted in the loss of many jobs, he said.

**SGT. DENNIS KEHOE Dies After Long Illness; Third Police Officer in City in Ten Days**

(Bridgeport, Conn., Post)

Funeral services for Sgt. Dennis Kehoe, a member of the Police Department, who died in his home, 126 Livingston place, at midnight last night, will be held there on Saturday at 8:30 a. m. in St. Charles church. Burial will be in St. Michael's cemetery.

Sgt. Kehoe was the third policeman to die in the city in 10 days. Sgt. Thomas McNamara died Feb. 27 and Capt. Arthur L. Prout, re-born on Monday last.

Sgt. Kehoe was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Canada, had been a resident of Bridgeport 51 years. Before enlisting in the police he had been in the employ of P. O. Lally, wholesale liquor dealer.

Appointed to the department April 15, 1906, Sgt. Kehoe's service record was among the longest of active policemen in the city.

He was promoted to a sergeant's rank June 1, 1916 and after the police radio system was installed, served as a radio dispatcher for some time. He had been ill and off duty during the past five months. He was a member of the State Police Association.

Sgt. Kehoe's wife, Mrs. Harriet Duphy Kehoe, died 17 years ago. He survived by two daughters, Miss Keary Kehoe and Mrs. Arthur Jones; two sons, Edward and George; a brother, Peter; a sister, Mrs. Mary Harrahan; nine nephews, Messrs. J. L. Douglas and Paul Macmillan, who at the close of the service will be taken care of by Mrs. Reuben Macdonald, seconded by Mrs. Benj. **Canadian Navy On Active Service Since War Started**

OTTAWA, March 9 (CP)—Of Canada's three armed services the navy was the only one to go on active service with its whole establishment on the outbreak of war and it has remained on active service every day of Canada's first six months of war. Although the navy has yet to come to grips with the enemy, it actually has been performing the tasks of war from the start, defending Canada's coasts, harbors and focal waters.

Because the navy has not been in a fight does not mean it has not defended Canada. Had it not been for the Canadian navy's establishment on the outbreak of war and it has remained on active service every day of Canada's first six months of war, the fact that those operations perhaps were closer to the front than any other activity in Canada and as vital to the national life as any.

The six modern destroyers and the minesweepers of the Canadian Navy were augmented recently by acquisition of a flotilla leader. To meet war conditions scores of smaller vessels were acquired by the navy and repaired and re-equipped where necessary.

New arrangements are being made for the construction of fast anti-submarine vessels in Canada to further augment protective forces operating off Canadian coasts.

The Royal Canadian Navy with the coastal defence batteries and Royal Canadian Air Force coastal patrol squadrons, assumed responsibility for the defence of Canadian coastal waters from the start of the war and also some responsibility for the defence of Newfoundland and the British Isles, French islands of the West Indies.

It also has charge to the organization of convoys of merchant ships on this side of the Atlantic and in assisting them for a certain time to sea.

The navy operates the inspection service at Canadian ports and maintains the anti-submarine nets and other water defences there. Every ship entering a Canadian port in wartime must pass inspection.

This work engages the services of some of the ships acquired by the navy for war purposes. An inspection vessel must ride the waters, day and night, in storm, mist, fog and fair weather outside each harbor. No vessel may enter without the approval of the men of the navy on this inspection ship.

Contrary to the general belief, the navy does not draw its recruits from the seaboard provinces alone. Men from every part of Canada were sent to the navy. It is quite a few miles from the coast to the western plains and never saw a large body of water until they came to the sea as members of the naval forces.
