THE MARITIME BOARD OF TRADE

Meeting Was Most Successful. Island's Claim for Better Winter Communication was well Received.

A number of the delegates to the Maritime Board of Trade, Yarmouth returned Saturday evening. Captain Read the new President remained behind for the excursion in the Lady Laurier around the coastline.

Father Burke who went West by train said that the meeting was a most important one as well for the nature of the work manipulated as by reason of the influential character of the delegates.

Ex President Spinney was an ideal officer and his management of the convention was much admired. The presentation of the subjects on the program was able in every case and the business like nature of the debate commendable.

The Island's great cause—communication—received a most sympathetic hearing and the Tunnel project a thorough endorsement.

The Island delegates were most enthusiastically welcomed and, as a delegates aid, Father Burke's ability and directiveness was never more admired.

By special invitation of the President he made the main address at the meeting on the Tunnel and now everybody is talking Tunnel and pledging themselves to help on its coming. He spoke for 30 minutes and enthused that great auditory as never before.

Capt Read in a clever speech replete with information seconded the resolution. Senator Ross, A. M. Bell, Halifax, B. B. Law, M. P. and others expressed their belief in the project and its early materialization. The resolution carried amidst cheers. Father Burke thanked the members for their sympathy and assistance and pledged himself to unrelenting effort till the Tunnel should be built. The feeling throughout Maritime Canada, is now most sanguine.

John Agnew, M.L.A., seconded the passing of a resolution for steamship service on North Shore ports.

Father Burke was a dominant member of nearly all committees and is now on the permanent one which must see the resolutions carried out. He received every honor. Capt. Read's election to the highest post is an honor to him and the Island. The next annual meeting is at Amherst.

Hon. Mr. Fielding and Father Burke had a long chat at St. John Saturday. Mr. Fielding asked the reverend gentleman for the receipt in bringing his resolution so unanimously through deliberative bodies. "I could not manage it," he said. "If your cause was as just as ours," replied Father Burke quickly, "you could." The public men of New Brunswick met in St. John and Moncton were most sympathetic. The Tunnel must come was the word on every lip.

But there are some malign influences at work as ever. "I was told by a large hardware dealer of Charlottetown," said a prominent hardware merchant of St. John, "that 'the Tunnel was folly'".

The press of the mainland are full of Tunnel and Father Burke has invitations without end to address various organizations on it.
