PORTLAND, Dec. 13—(By wire)—A special train bringing several hundred immigrants to sail for Liverpool was wrecked at West Paris on the Grand Trunk.

WELL RIVER, Dec. 13—(By wire)—The engineer and fireman of a north bound freight train were killed south of here today, when the locomotive struck a large rock that had been dislodged by a blast and thrown on tracks.

ST. JOHN, Dec. 12—A survey of the three properties adjoining the new land acquired last year by the C. P. R. at the head of the harbor, it is stated, will be followed by the purchase by the Company of these properties which are valued at half million.

SUMMERSIDE, Dec. 13—(Special Correspondence)—Today the Empress took to Pt du Chene fifteen passengers, two hundred dressed hogs, five hundred cases eggs and two cars mixed freight.

There is a good deal of freight moving to and from Summerside by the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Co Steamer and indications are that there will be good cargoes until the wintry weather enforces her to lay up for the winter.

NASSAU, Bahama Islands, Dec. 11—An unknown French bark, it was reported today, was seen on fire near Long Island. She sank in eight fathoms of water. It is not known whether the crew were saved.

HALIFAX, Dec. 14—(By wire)—The North Atlantic Collieries, Cape Breton, were today sold at foreclosure at the suit of the bond-holders and were purchased by Stone and Webber of Boston for \$70,500.

ROME, December 13—As a result of a decree of the Pope issued in July in reference to St. Patrick's Day was struck off the list of Irish obligatory holidays on which Catholics are called upon to hear mass and abstain from unnecessary work. At the request of the Irish Catholic hierarchy, however, the holy see has just issued another decree which is interesting to Irish people throughout the world. According to this the feast of St. Patrick will continue to be a holy day in Ireland, without, however, being preceded by a day of fasting or abstinence.
