Pushing Railway Through Siberia

MOSCOW, Nov. 4—(AP)—Far from the Japanese and the world at large, the Bolsheviks are driving ahead through the wastes of Siberia at a terrific clip to complete the most important new military railway in the world. Persons in the position to know declare the government is using 1,000,000 men on the parallel link to the trans-Siberian railway that will run north of the famous Lake Baikal and give the Russians an auxiliary railroad to the Far East removed from the threatened Manchurian frontiers.

This rail link, roughly 2,000 miles in length, is unquestionably the most secret major piece of engineering construction going on in the world today.

About all anyone knows of it is that it leaves the trans-Siberian at a point just east of Krasnoyarsk, perhaps Taishe, runs straight east through virgin and unsurveyed forests of Siberia until it reaches a point parallel and about 300 miles north of the northern tip of Manchuria. There the eastward construction stops and a branch line running south links it with the trans-Siberian.

One Survivor Of Quadruple Birth Given Even Chance

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 4—The one surviving baby of quadruplets born to a Missouri sharecropper's wife took a few drops of nourishment today and received a physician's verdict of an even chance to live.

Tipping the scales at a bare two pounds, Lee Earl Bridges slept quietly in her incubator, refreshed after a light feeding of mother's milk glucose and water.

A sister, Ella Pearl Bridges, died today, 36 hours after birth in the swampland cabin of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Bridges, near Senath, Mo. They were brought here by ambulance after the death of their brother and sister shortly after the quadruple birth.

Search Made For Missing Farmer

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 4—Searchers tonight were looking for Cordon P. Bull, prosperous farmer of Lower Woodstock who has been missing since yesterday afternoon. The neighborhood and shores of the nearby St. John river were scrutinized without success.

Owner of one of the finest agricultural properties in Carleton county, Bull has been living on the farm with a helper. He was warmly dressed and carried a rifle when he last left the house saying he intended to pile some wood. Later it was learned no wood has been cut in the locality he mentioned.

About 60 men under police leadership began a systematic search of the district today. A larger party planned to go out tomorrow if Bull continues missing.
