The Guardian has received an extended report of the P. E. Island Baptist Conference, held with the Alberton and Springfield churches, Rev. F. N. Atkinson, pastor, at O'Leary Station, on the 10th and 11th inst. Owing to the pressure on space, and to the fact that the report is a little behind time, not so much room can be given it as would otherwise be entitled to—a fact which The Guardian regrets. The opening service on the 10th consisted of bright singing, earnest prayer, and two able addresses by Rev. M. W. Brown, of Nova Scotia, who gave a forcible account of Acadia College. This was followed by an address on Christian Education, by Rev. G. R. White, of Charlottetown. Leading delegates pronounced this one of the best educational meetings they ever attended. On the following day, Wednesday, the weather was not very favorable, the roads being almost impassable, but the services were well attended. In the forenoon reports were read from the different churches, showing that progress is being made and the work encouraging. Charlottetown is aiming to reduce its debt of \$200,000, \$150,000 being already subscribed. Summerside has its beautiful new church which was dedicated on the 22nd inst. Some regret was expressed because of the small number of delegates in attendance and the Conference wished it distinctly understood that it was not a minister's conference, but each church is asked to send two or three delegates. The delegates were as follows: Springfield, Deacon H. F. Jelly, E. J. Ledstone, W. T. Costall and Astor Atkins; Alberton, Deacon W. S. Clark; East Point, Pastor Besman; Tryon, W. J. B. Miller; Charlottetown, Pastor White; Summerside, Pastor and Mrs. Crowell; Deacon G. W. Warren and Sister Glidden. Pastor McPhee is moving from Hazelbrook to Montague; the Baptists and Disciples have formed a co-operative movement at Hazelbrook similar to that of East Point in support of a pastor. Ulster and Belfast are agitating a like movement. The conference regretted the removal from the Province of two pastors—Rev. J. E. Tiner and J. G. A. Belyea and passed resolutions of appreciation for their services. The matter of re-adjusting fields was carefully considered. President Crowell gave an excellent paper on Soul Winning on the afternoon of the 11th; and the ladies conducted a missionary meeting. The financial statement sent in by A. W. S. Eric, Charlottetown, made a good showing, over \$100 of the \$1200 set for from the churches has been paid. The evening service was one of inspiring singing and earnest prayer and an excellent sermon from Pastor Beaman, Rev. M. W. Brown led it after meeting. The Conference made mention of the long, useful, consecrated and efficient life and Christian work of the late Deacon Scott of East Point. Several spoke of the royal entertainment enjoyed and resolutions expressive of the hospitality received were unanimously passed.
