The last issue of the Canada Gazette contains a notice in the Headquarters General Orders to the effect that the Royal School of Artillery at Prince Edward Island is to be re-organized. Notice is also given of the disbanding of the Rifle Associations at O'Leary and at Charlottetown.

ACCORDING to a notice in the Canada Gazette the importation into Canada of animals from all countries, other than the United States, Newfoundland and Mexico, is prohibited except at the ports of Victoria, Vancouver, Quebec, Halifax, St. John, N. B., Charlottetown, P. E. I., and such other ports as may hereafter be indicated by the Minister.

THERE is no foundation for the report that the engagement of Miss Hannah C. Gillespie of Appleton Road to Alexander Goodwin McPhee, Riverdale, has been announced. The Guardian has been asked to correct any such impression which may have been caused. On Monday a man presented in our store a Dominion of Canada note, which had been raised from \$2 to \$5 in value. He stated that he had got the note from a foreign peddler. THE Worcester, Mass., Telegram has the following regarding J. B. Coulson, a well known Islander, now resident in Worcester: The appointment last week of James H. Shirley, Chicago, as United States consul for Charlottetown, P. E. I., terminated a spirited contest. Among the candidates was James B. Coulson, president of the Maritime provinces association, and circulation manager of the Post. His claim was based upon the fact that he was a native of the island, and familiar with the people and government of the province. Mr. Coulson's candidacy was endorsed by Worcester citizens, headed by Mayor John T. Duggan, and the Worcester branch of the Maritime provinces association, which secured the assistance of Congressman Charles G. Washburn. A letter received by Mr. Coulson last week from Congressman Washburn, said that the consulate at Charlottetown had been filled. Congressman Washburn stated that the appointments from Massachusetts have so far exceeded the quota of Massachusetts, that so far as it can be done with the good of the service, the department is making appointments from other states. The congressman regrets that the matter terminated in such a way. A petition advancing the candidacy of Mr. Coulson has been in circulation for several weeks, but it was called in yesterday. It is considered that too many consular appointments have been made out of the state of Massachusetts.

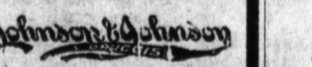
MOCK PARLIAMENT held its usual weekly session last night, with a fair attendance of members. Fred Cooney continued the debate on the Empire bill. He thought that the only way of keeping the Empire from disintegration was, by this measure. C. W. Mathieson ridiculed the proposed federation and the ambitious schemes of the First Minister. He was in favor of the bill so far as it strengthened the empire from attacks of outside foes. E. V. Macmillan then followed and spoke in favor of the bill. R. H. Campbell opposition member, contended that the time would come, when Canada would be greater in wealth, and power than Great Britain. In this federation Canada in time would be the predominant part. Lyle McLeod ridiculed the argument of the previous speakers and was speaking when the House adjourned.
