**KILLED IN ACTION**



**GARNETT BUELL**

The sincere sympathy of the whole community goes out to Mrs. Walter Buell, Murray River, in the loss she has sustained in the death of her noble brother Garnett Buell, who was killed in action upon the battlefield of Belgium on November 5th, 1918, while nobly doing his share for liberty and freedom from the cruel Hun. Garnett was a smart intelligent boy only seventeen years old when he enlisted. He was beloved by all who knew him for his bright smiles and winning ways had won all hearts.

Pte. Buell enlisted in March 1916 in the 55th Battalion, Charlottetown, and after having the usual training in Sussex and Valcartier he crossed over to England in October. He then trained at Bramshot, Hythe and Lill, till March 1916 when he crossed over to France being transferred to the 60th Battalion. He took part in much heavy fighting including the battles of Somme, Vimy Ridge, Arras, Ypres, Paschendale, Lens and Cambrai being thirty two months in the trenches.

In October, 1917 Pte. Buell won the Military Medal for conspicuous bravery shown on the field, and again was transferred to the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles with which battalion he served until the time of his death while nobly driving the enemy out of the village of Vicy.

Belgium,  
Nov. 22nd, 1918

Dear Mrs. Buell:—I am writing to you to tell how very very sorry we are for you in the death of your brother No. 444438 Pte. Garnett Buell who was killed on the 5th inst., driving the enemy back toward the village of Vicy, five miles or so east of Valenciennes. His officer was very fond of him and said he was a very brave soldier. He was first buried near where he fell with three of his comrades L. Cpl. Blackney, L. Cpl. Paxton and Pte. Smith. L. Cpl. Paxton's wife lives at 162 1/2 Sydenham Street, Toronto, you might like to write to her. Comrades gave them the kindest possible burial but the location was not good so later we had them all moved into a nice cemetery just outside of Oronnag and had the burial service read through. I had previously read it at their former grave. Address 2nd C. M. R. Belgium. May our kind Heavenly Father comfort you in the loss of so kind and brave a brother.
