viding a staple supply of food and clothing. The herd is reported to be in excellent condition and the natives entrusted with its management are taking a keen interest in the enterprise. Thus Canada's experiment in converting the Eskimos from hunters to herdsmen appears to be making favourable progress.

Canada's Eskimos are making good as reindeer herders, according to the Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa. A report shows that the herd placed under native management last December has increased by about 350 fawns, and now totals approximately 1,200 head. Since its transfer to the Anderson River area, about 150 miles east of the government reindeer station, the native herd has been managed by Eskimo herders, under the supervision of the chief government herder. Establishment of this native herd is another step in Canada's plan to establish reindeer ranching among the Eskimos as a means of assisting the natives by providing a staple supply of food and clothing.

Spaghetti with Sliced Frankfurters

Slice crosswise into 1/4 inch slices 3 or 4 left over frankfurters.
Brown with 1/2 cup (1 medium) finely chopped onion in 2 tablespoons butter.
