VICS DEFEAT ABBIES 4-2

Abbies Won Second Game by Score of 3-2

By winning last night's game in the Arena Ring the Victorias established themselves as claimants to the championship trophy.

It was a very good game and the ice although soft on top was better than that for the Vic-Conn game, it being easier to carry the puck and combine.

Percy Rodd called the game at 8:35 o'clock, with Frank McCarey as his associate in office.

The first half was fairly fast with but little combination. After 11 minutes of play the only goal of the half was scored by the Victorias.

There were two penalties of 1 minute each given to Lane and Gaudet for minor offences.

The first part of the second half was of an even nature but then the Abbies started to rush things and for a while had the Vics continually on the defensive and but for the good work of the defence, especially Dougan, who made a number of difficult stops, the score would have read differently at the end.

While D. Gillis was in the penalty box the Abbies combined well and landed their first goal evening the score. From this on the game was quite interesting and provided much excitement for the fans, who were out in fine voice. Then the Vics scored again getting the lead. The Abbies were now continuing their splendid style of play and soon L. Campbell made the score a draw by sending in No. 2 for the Abbies, 2-2. The Vics who had been for a short while playing principally defensive took the aggressive which they played until the end, and made the sign read: Vics 3, Abbies, 2. Shortly before the close of

the half the Vics got another and the game ended in a splendid victory for the wearers of red and blue by the score of 4-2.

Duffy did not play on the Abbies and C. Campbell moved up to the right wing position. J. Gaudet played point in his well-known manner, to the older fans, and his stopping was a feature. Van Idernstine did not play but B. Beer defended the net well. Otherwise the team was the same.

Lane played at centre with the Vics last night along with Gregory, who last night showed up excellently. J. Prowse and H. Gillis were on the wings and Dougan, D. Gillis and W. Prowse made up the defence.

The referee and judge of play discharged their duties in a satisfactory and business-like manner.

In the second game the Abbies were the winners by the close score of 3-2. Up to half-time no goals had been scored.

ST. DUNSTAN'S MOCK PARLIAMENT

St. Dunstan's Mock Parliament held its regular session last evening. Mr. E. Doyle, Charlottetown, who was speaking at last adjournment concluded his address. He contended that the bill regarding the sale and importation of liquor was promulgated merely to placate the more radical total abstinence party without, at the same time, hindering the other members of the Government from their continuous worship at the shrine of Bacchus.

He was followed by Hon. E. McMillan, Summerside, who believed that the money that would be saved to the country by the passage of this bill would go towards feeding the Canadian forces on the field.

Mr. W. Monaghan, Moosejaw, showed that the bill covered merely the sale and importation of liquor and that its provisions might easily be evaded by several persons joining in a communistic brewery and providing their raw material.

Hon. G. Morrison, Selkirk, upheld the bill and predicted that it would go down to future generations as a lasting memorial of the Crepeau-McDougal Government.

Mr. F. McKenna, Camrose, ridiculed the bill and contended that licensed bars were much more efficient than the law proposed.

Mr. P. McQuaid, Rimouski, who made his debut at this sitting, cited the many evils resulting from the use of intoxicating liquors and trusted that this bill would do much towards eliminating them.

Mr. R. St. John, St. John, reprimanded the Government for their neglect of duty in subordinating the interests of the Mother Country at this critical moment of her existence to those party politics.

The Premier, Hon. Henri Crepeau, Quebec, with his characteristic eloquence, refuted many of the objections raised by the members of the Opposition and gave several reasons justifying the introduction of the bill at this time.

The Leader of the Opposition, Mr. O. B. Trainor, Victoria, showed clearly that the Government contention, that the fact that Russia and France had prohibited the sale of liquor was an argument in favor of this bill, was entirely erroneous, the conditions that prevailed in those countries being non-existent in Canada.

The House adjourned at 9 p.m.

COPPER EN ROUTE TO GERMANS SEIZED.

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 15.—A large shipment of copper, packed in casks which were labelled "sugar" and put aboard the steamship Carmen, was seized to-day. The copper was consigned to a German firm. The shipper and the captain were arrested.
