FARMERS INSTITUTE MEETING.—On Monday, July 12th, Mr. W. R. Shaw, District Representative for Queens County, addressed a meeting of the Farmers Institute at Mayfield. His subject was "Soil Fertility, and the Method whereby our Soils may be kept up to a certain Standard." He showed how soil which a few years ago raised large amounts of food had through continuous cropping and selling off in the raw state become depleted of their elements of fertility. He then dwelt on the importance of perfect cultivation as a means of re-leasing dominant plant food in the soil, making a more suitable condition for plant growth and thus increasing our crops. The care, attention and application of farmyard manure was then taken up, followed by a discussion of green manuring. Many questions were asked and valuable points brought out and discussed by those present. The meeting closed with a vote of thanks to Mr Shaw for his address.
