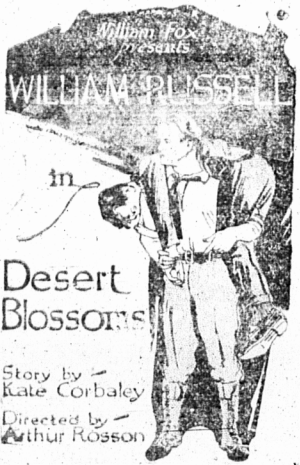

IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN MCKINNON

The news of the death of Mr. John McKinnon, an old Sturgeon which which event occurred on the 29th, January 1922, was met with sadness and regret by those who were known to him.

He was not expected to die until a short time before it happened. But human aid proved unavailing and he passed away at the advanced age of 76 years. Mr. McKinnon was highly esteemed by his friends and acquaintances owing to his sterling integrity, uprightness and kindness in his daily life. He was a faithful husband, affectionate father and kind neighbor. Mr. McKinnon was born in Malpique 26 years ago and moved to Sturgeon with his parents 25 years ago. Although numbers of his friends

MR. HENRY A. MORRISON

The many friends of Henry A. Morrison were shocked to learn of his sudden death, due to cerebral hemorrhage at the Cambridge Municipal Hospital, on Feb. 4th, says the Cambridge Chronicle. Born in Fairhaven, Mass., Sept. 18th, 1860, at the early age of two years, with his parents, he moved to Prince Edward Island where he spent his young life, returning to Cambridge at the age of twenty-two when he entered the employ of the Wellington Pulp Co., contractors, with whom he was a valued employee and one of the firm's best foremen, until death claimed him. One of the last important jobs of which he was foreman was the first section of the Municipal Hospital in which he passed away.

He is survived by his aged mother Mrs. Margaret Morrison, a sister, Mrs. John T. Wood, and his brother, Kenneth Jr., 31 of Dundas also a sister, Mrs. A. B. Gates of Brooklyn, New York, and brothers, William D. of Belleville, Ontario, and George C. of Boston, Mass. The numerous and beautiful floral offerings were silent expressions of the esteem in which Mr. Morrison was held by his friends. The funeral services were held at St. Asburn chapel, the remains being placed in a tomb there to be interred later, on Tuesday Feb. 7th, at 2 p. m. and was largely attended. Rev. Dr. B. A. Elliot, pastor of the Harvard St. Methodist Church officiated. The Pilgrim Male Quartette sang three selections. Out of respect for the deceased, the Fillmore Concern closed its offices and building operations during the funeral, and a large delegation of employees attended. The Lodge of which he was a member was present in a body.

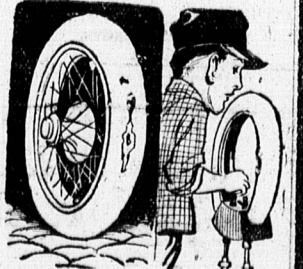
