ESTIMATED VALUE OF OUR PRODUCTION PER HEAD.

A writer in the Canadian Farm, all the potatoes he uses in the family or feeds to stock at 40 cents per bushel, the butter at 25 cents per pound, the other grains, meats and farm products generally that he feeds or consumes, at the prices above implied, his living expenses would be quite formidable, and the pork, poultry, horses and cattle that he sells would have cost a good deal to produce. And there are many things that the farmer must buy for himself and his family that the farm does not produce. Still it is well to have an estimate of the annual production, even if it is a rather loose and uncertain one.

This is obviously an over-estimate in prices, if not in quantities. Indeed, in another paragraph he quotes the total value of "field crops" at \$9,700,000. To these he adds:

By adding the field crops at \$9,700,000 to the animals and fisheries products as here given the correspondent estimates a total production for the farm and fisheries of \$13,000,000 as first above stated. Assuming that 85,000 people, or, say, 17,000 families, are engaged in the farming, dairying and fishing industries, this would give, for those following these callings, a production of \$153 per head, or \$765 per family. Whether this estimate covers what the farming and fishing population consume of their own food products and the seed for next year's planting, as we are left to assume it does, we are not explicitly told. In any case not much, if any wheat would be sold outside the farming and fishing community.

It is well known that considerable flour is imported. And if the farmer charges up to living expenses

not, but above them all, dominating all, unfalling as the seasons, come the annual apotheosis of Burns, the thrilling and spectacular Games and the triumphant festival of St. Andrew.

There will be a good time at the Caledonian festival tonight. There always was and always will be a good time on St. Andrew's Night. The Caledonians know how to do these things. And behind it all is the energy, the patriotic spirit the self-sufficiency, we had almost added the concert—for this also helps—to make the festival a great success.

What is the matter with those terrible Suffragettes? Premier Asquith promised them that in the new Parliament, should it be in his power, he would introduce a woman suffrage bill. A mere man would have thought this would please them. On the contrary, it seems to have enraged them, and they smashed his windows, and got themselves arrested and sentenced to prison with hard labor. Surely this was quite un-ladylike.

Tariff reform, federation, home rule, improved liquor legislation, educational reform, are all questions of importance which the British people will in due time settle to their own liking. But how can these questions, or any of them be settled according to the popular will while the House of Lords blocks the way at every turn? Clearly the first thing to do is to break the blockade, achieve legislative independence and get a system of representative machinery that will conform to the popular will.

It argues that duties on imports of farm machinery do not affect the price, they simply "keep the Canadian market for the Canadian manufacturer"—at his own price! Still the Examiner thinks "the Government would do well if it should bring down the duty on harvesting machinery to the level of that of the United States." This admission shows that The Examiner does not believe in its own logic. If the present duties do not increase the prices why in the name of all that's logical ought they to be reduced?

The Examiner foresees a general shake-up in the local Government. According to its forecast Premier Haszard is very shortly to be made a Judge, Hon. Mr. Cumiskey to vacate his present position, H. J. Palmer or J. J. Hughes to become leader of the Government, a new Commissioner of Works to be found, and Hon. D. A. McKinnon to be the Liberal candidate in Belfast in the general election. The Patriot replies that in all likelihood the present Government will appeal to the people when its full term has expired. Time will tell which is nearest right. There are many rumors afloat.

ARE KEITHS TO BUILD THEATRE IN ST JOHN?

That St. John is to have a new theatre built from American plans and costing in the vicinity of \$90,000 is once more said than to be certain. A few weeks ago there was a rumor to the effect that a large property deal in which considerable real estate on the south side of King square changed hands, had taken place. At the time those who were said to be directly interested, while not denying the rumor, refused to give out any information. Within the last few days, however, the matter has been very freely discussed and it is now known for a fact that all the property commencing with Barry's livery stable and terminating at the Dufferin Hotel has either changed hands or is about to be taken over.

While Keith's representative here has no knowledge of them negotiating for a theatre site in St. John a man who should be in a position to know, said Saturday that a new theatre is to be erected on the south side of King square by the Keith people. In addition to the statement that the property has been taken over or is about to be taken over, it is said that the plans for the theatre have been prepared.

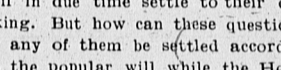

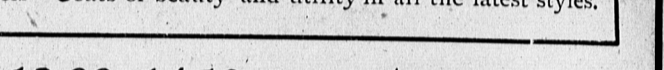

There was not a citizen of Cottage Grove, who had resided there any length of time, who was not deeply grieved to receive the news of the death of our esteemed townsman, Druggist Harry B. Brehaut, at his home in this city last Friday afternoon, November 11, 1910, after a brief illness from dropsy and heart trouble.
