Y. W. C. A. BUILDING ON HISTORIC SITE
HALIFAX, N. S., July 22—New buildings for old! An old landmark of Barrington Street, opposite the Ladies' College, has been removed to make room for the Young Women's Christian Association building a fire-proof construction, to be erected on that site. The old building was erected about one hundred and nine years ago by Laurence O'Connor Doyle, and one of Joseph Howe's colleagues during the struggle for responsible government. The removal of the historic residence conjures up memories of other prominent Halifax families. After the death of Laurence Doyle the house came into the possession of Edward Kennedy, afterwards Sir Edward, who lived there for many years and raised a family of boys and girls who became prominent in business and society for many years in Halifax. After Sir Edward's death it became the property of Wiley Smith, of the firm of A. & W. Smith, wholesale grocery merchants. The house was situated on Pleasant Street, now Barrington, the once well-known residential section of the city, which commenced at the head of Salter Street, and ran south to Point Pleasant.
