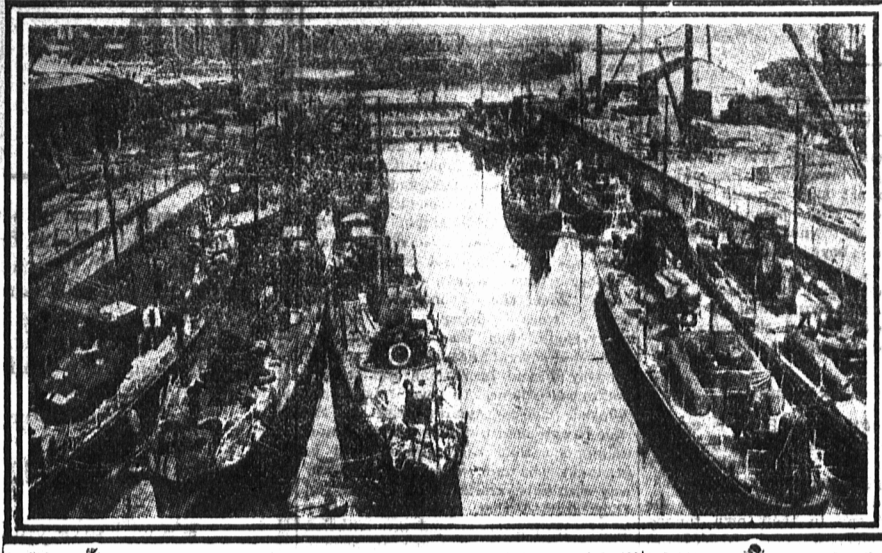
Thomas Williams and Robert Smith suddenly capsized. Shelly a one was saved.

JAP MOSQUITO FLEET LYING AT DALNY.

AN IMPORTANT FORT IS CAPTURED

Commanding Port Arthur and Greatly Weakening the Defences.

A COAL FAMINE THREATENED THERE

A Battle is Hourly Expected Near Mukden—Kuropatkin Reports Japs Failure and Oku Claims a Complete Victory.

BATTLE IS EXPECTED.

LONDON, Sept. 22—(Special.)—A battle is hourly expected to occur in the vicinity of Fushun, thirty miles east of Mukden. THE JAPS' ATTEMPTS FAIL.

Kuropatkin reports a failure of the continued Japanese attempts to turn the Russian left.

The Russian Cavalry is carrying on reconnoitering operations against the Japanese advance lines near Yentai.

It is said the Japanese have captured another important fort dominating Port Arthur and affording excellent gun positions and consequently greatly weakening the Russian position.

COAL FAMINE AT PORT ARTHUR.

The Russian cruisers at Vladivostok are declared to have been fully repaired and ready for action again.

A coal famine is said to exist at Port Arthur.

COMPLETE VICTORY OF JAPS.

General Oku in his report on Liaq Yang fighting declares that Kuropatkin had all preparations made to hold that fort and the Japanese victory therefor was a complete one.

QUEEN'S COUNTY RIFLE SHOOTING

Capt. Macdonnell was range officer and conducted the whole shooting without a hitch or casualty of any kind. Great credit is also due Staff Sergeant Grey, the veteran rifleman who has for years been Secretary of the Association as well as the entire committee of management.

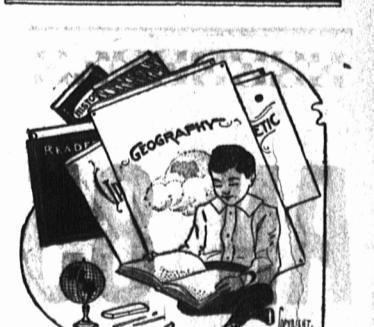
