The officers reported an increase of 4,000 in the membership. During the year seventy-six lodge warrants were issued, the largest total for fifty years.

A MEETING of the board of directors of the New Brunswick Deaf Mute Association was held at St. John recently to arrange for the second convention on Moncton this summer. The board fixed the date of the coming convention at Sept. 3rd, 4th and 5th next. It was agreed to invite Rev. Stanley S. Searing, pastor of the St. Andrews' Mission for deaf mutes at Boston, to hold his services to the visiting mutes at Moncton on Sunday, Sept. 3rd. The board appointed Wm. Bullie, of St. John, W. J. Murray, J. C. Avard, W. W. Dryden and Geo. S. Mackenzie to form a committee on arrangements for the convention. It is proposed to change the N. B. (and P. E. I.) association to a Maritime Association with Nova Scotia.—Moncton Times.

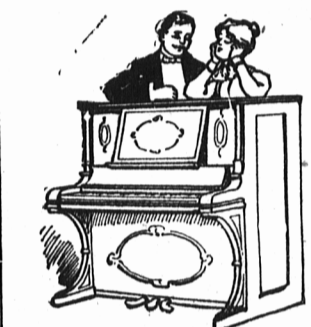
