Marshall Says Cuts Would Ruin E. R. P.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 11 - The "father" and the "boss" of the European Recovery Program said today that the program faces ruin if spending cuts voted by the House of Representatives are allowed to stand.

State Secretary Marshall said the 16-power recovery effort will be a "calculated risk for failure" unless the Senate succeeds in restoring most of the House cuts. Paul G. Hoffman, administrator of the program, said the cuts would practically wipe out "the most productive and the most far-reaching part" - putting European industry back on its feet.

Canada's Imports From U. S. Decline

OTTAWA, June 11 - (CP) - Canada's imports from the United States in April dropped substantially from the high levels of last year under the Government's dollar-saving program. April imports were \$159,500,000 against \$181,600,000 last year. Meanwhile, imports from the United Kingdom climbed steadily. U. K. imports rose from \$21,600,000 in March to \$24,600,000 in April, comparing with \$12,700,000 in April last year and the 1935-39 average of \$6,400,000. Total U. S. imports for the first four months of the year were worth \$584,600,000 compared with \$622,000,000 in 1947.

Installment Buying Reported On Increase

(By The Canadian Press) BANFF, Alta., June 11 - Installment buying, the craze of the 1920's, is on the increase in Canada and the United States, Dean Ashby of Omaha, Neb., newly-elected president of the National Retail Credit Association said today.

In a press interview following his election at final sessions of the International Credit Conference yesterday, Mr. Ashby said installment buying, under its new titles of time payments or budget plans, will continue the expansion of credit for several years.

"But," he said, "we are not going wild this time as some of us did before the depression of 1929. There is a keen interest on the part of credit men and bureau managers to control customers' credit requests, so that there will be no over expansion."

Seek Market For Apple, Tobacco Crops

OTTAWA, June 11 - (CP) - Trade Minister Howe said today in the Commons that efforts will be made to find markets for Canada's apple and tobacco crops this year.

He said the 1947 apple crop has all been sold. "Do you mean the British Columbia crop, too?" asked James Sinclair (L. - Vancouver North).

"Yes," said Mr. Howe. "There are 600,000 boxes in Yale," said Mr. Sinclair.

Mr. Howe said the apples had been sold. The United Kingdom market was closed, but the United States had lowered the tariffs on apples and efforts will be made to sell apples to other countries.

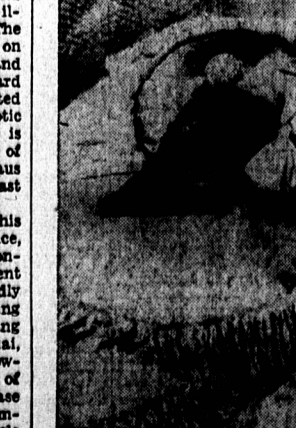
A "good part" of the 1947 British Columbia crop was sold to Brazil in a barter for oranges.
